and disseminating," Feldman says. "We do sometimes take on public improvement projects, like the road surfacing in the early '90s. But the niche that we're currently filling is in the area of financial analysis."

In December, concerned by the lack of information provided by the Kensington Police Protection and Community Services District, KPOA and its members investigated financials available to the public and sent a community-wide letter detailing the district's finances and prospects. "That was information that ended up being discussed at the KPPCSD's finance committee and at the full board meeting," Feldman says.

Every year, the four-decade-old organization hosts a general membership meeting on issues of interest to Kensington residents; past meetings have examined the school district, undergrounding utilities, and debated controversies such as merging Kensington's two special districts, police and fire. This year's meeting, on Sunday, May 3, from 2:00-4:00 p.m. at the Community Center, returns to the subject of special districts. A panel of speakers will discuss the structure and requirements of special districts, comment upon the current state of the Police and Fire districts, and take questions from the audience. Anyone confused about special districts will gain a great deal from this event. In April, KPOA commences its membership drive through its annual meeting notice. The mailing you'll soon receive contains a return envelope. Feldman hopes that everyone will send back \$5.00 in dues to become a voting member of KPOA. The money funds communitywide printing and mailing of information such as the analysis of KPPCSD finances and supports community endeavors, such as the park and Eagle Scout projects. "It's a small contribution that can return big dividends," says Feldman.



#### April Tips from CERT—Water

CERT is your Community Emergency Response Team. You live in one of 6 Kensington CERT Areas. To find out which Area you live in and who your CERT leader is go to: www.elcerrito.org/index.aspx?NID=579. We need to work together to prepare for disasters, but there is a lot you can do for yourself. Complete one task each month, and in 12 months you will be better prepared to survive an emergency. This month let's tackle WATER. In an earthquake we may be without any water for days, weeks or longer. How Much Do You Need to Store-Experts say at least 3 gallons per person per day, with a minimum 3-day supply. EBMUD recommends a 14-day supply of water at 1 gallon per person per day. Don't forget to factor pets into your calculations! How To Store It-You can buy water in plastic containers at the grocery store, and put the purchase date on the container when you buy it. Don't use glass containers as they may break. Rotate your water every 6 months—or store the out-of-date supply for hygiene. You can buy a heavy duty plastic water barrel at Costco that holds 55 gallons and comes with its own wrench. You'll need a pump to get the water out and a plastic jug to put it in. Share your ideas about WATER in times of disaster with your Kensington neighbors. Together we're all smarter! Your Kensington neighbors are preparing, are YOU?



#### **Carmelite Monastery Bells are Chiming**

Kensington resident Eric Riess graciously supplied us with an update on the Carmelite Monastery. As many local residents may know, a new order of Carmelite Sisters has moved into the monastery on Rincon Road. Without belaboring the challenging recent history of the location, Eric thought it might be helpful to tell Kensington residents about this unique community.

After the previous Sisters left the residence, the site was purchased by an anonymous benefactor who donated it back to the Church for use by the Sisters. Over the last year, there were renovations made to the building which allowed 10 Carmelite Sisters to move in last November. The Sisters dedicate their life to the Church and to prayer but depend on the local community for support. They are deeply grateful for all the warm kindness and generosity that has already been shown since they arrived. From the time the gates open at 6:30 a.m. the front entry and the adjacent chapel are open to anyone who needs a quiet place for reflection or would like to listen to the Sisters' prayers. Mass is held regularly in the chapel, but the exact schedule can vary and is posted on the door.

The Sisters do not generally speak with the public, but requests for prayers or intentions are welcomed whenever the building is open. There is a large turn-style in the front entryway, where residents can leave requests for prayers or donations. The Sisters are dependent on the community for much of their food and necessities. They are planning a new vegetable garden along with extensive landscaping to replant flower gardens and revitalize fruit trees that were planted years ago. Anyone interested in making other donations can leave a note in the turn style asking the Sisters for their needs.

Additionally, the monastery continues to need serious repairs and the Diocese of Oakland has established a building fund to help pay for the construction. Residents who would like to contribute can contact the Sisters through the turn-style. For now, the gates to the property remain open until 6:30 p.m. and Kensington residents can once again hear the chime of bells calling the Sisters to prayer.






