

Inside the KPPCSD

The Kensington Police Protection and Community Services District continues to confront budget, morale, and personnel challenges.

Budget. The increasing compensation (including retiree costs) associated with providing public safety in Kensington has now outstripped relatively flat property tax growth. Proposals to solve projected budget deficits include: putting to a vote an increase of the police tax assessment, reducing the number of officers, and/or contracting out police services to El Cerrito.

Morale. Claims by some police officers of a "hostile work environment" pre-date current Chief, Greg Harman's tenure, and appear to endure. (The investigator who performed the two internal investigations #08-04 and #08-05 – "alleged hostile work environment," initiated in 2008, determined that "there has not been a hostile work environment as alleged.")

As personnel issues such as these are private by statute, it's difficult to get the facts about the exact nature of the officers' past and current complaints. Neither the Board President, Bill Wright, Chief Harman, nor the four officers rumored to be absent without leave appear to be at liberty to speak. (Recent reports indicate two of the four have apparently returned to work.)

Previous interim Chief of Police, Brown Taylor, has been engaged as a consultant to assist the board and Chief in dealing with the personnel problems faced by the District. Wright says Taylor's mandate will be to "take a look at the reporting structure, directions for the future, provide guidance to the chief, (and) to work with us individually, so the board has the benefit

Dear Editor,

Signs of our times.

A hearty thank you! from this corner at least to those few who took the creative initiative to conceive, install, and pay for the new Welcome to Kensington sign. Seems friendly, mellow, and certainly green. And stylistically evocative of the era Kensington arose on this hillside. Most folks I've spoken with agree to its positive appeal, especially considering the splintery-looking and otherwise unimaginative sign it replaced that most of us, I daresay, simply ignored or endured.

Now if gaudy/ugly's still the topic, one can do little worse than the authoritarian, hostile and boringly formulaic and-a-onetwo-three-four-FIVE STOP signs gracing this intersection, one of which compromises the new welcome sign as seen from the south. Wouldn't YIELD signs be more appropriate to this mature and peaceful village? My knowledge of the stop signs' pre-history is that the intersection was largely problem-free and certainly no site of public sacrifice and carnage. But if two stop signs there simply must be at the ARLINGTON ACE hardware store, why not have the offending left (west)-side sign be mounted on the light post not far beyond (northward)? After all, that's what was done coming the other way (south). Think of all the annual pollution caused by all this braking to stop, not to mention fuel waste by having to drive in lower gears even more. And, why not take a clue from cities in Germany, Belgium, Italy, and France now enjoying freedom from any traffic control signage at major intersections?

Could it be the dreaded HSI (hypersignage-itis) syndrome that explains the suffering certain Kensingtons are experiencing over the new sign? There's even been a call for a community-wide meeting to establish a committee (a la Berkeley's fabled Arts Commission, perhaps?) to guide us to a more artistically palatable new-new sign. After Diebenkorn? Modigliani? Schoolyard swing set becomes a space station?

Our independent police department reflects the unique character and values of Kensington residents. Residents and officers know each other and our police officers know our community. Because we

have local control over our police services, we have been able to contain costs and ensure a high level of service from trained peace officers. But there is a move afoot to contract our police services out to El Cerrito or some other police department. If that were to happen, we would be forfeiting our ability to meaningfully affect staffing levels and costs, and to ensure the highest level of protection for Kensington residents. The impact on our community could be devastating, as the needs of the Kensington community would no longer be the first priority of the police. And without a local and dedicated police department, an important part of what makes our town a safe and comfortable place to raise our children would be lost.

Many residents in this community do not believe this decision - that will affect and touch all of our lives - should be made in a meeting room on a weeknight with only a few Kensington residents in attendance. For that reason, we are petitioning for an initiative to ensure that changes in the way police services are provided to our community can be made only with the approval of a majority of the voters.

If you want to have a say in the way police services are delivered, signing the petition is the only way to make that happen. Otherwise, our independent police services may be drastically changed without the input or support of the Kensington community at large.

We will be circulating the petition over the summer. The circulators of the petition will be happy to answer any questions about this critical issue.

A sign recently erected on the vacant lot on the Colusa Circle (401 Colusa) misleadingly depicts a 3-story building, and mentions available office space. Many residents have concluded that this indicates the 401 Colusa property owners have received approval from the County to build this project. But that is not the case.

The Kensington Municipal Advisory Council unanimously recommended against this plan. [sic] It was then rejected last October in a 5-1 vote of the Contra Costa County Planning Commission. The owners are now appealing that decision to the County Board of Supervisors. Our neighborhood group has advocated that the building be limited to 2 stories to protect residential views of San Francisco







of outside expertise in addition to relying on current staff."

Personnel. The police department continues to be at full staffing for sworn personnel, "with two members on extended leave." District-wide police coverage remains at pre-existing levels. Patrol functions are currently being handled by two teams, working 12-hour shifts. According to Chief Harman, the department is "in the background process" with four candidates for Reserve Police Officer.

Investigation of Alleged Misconduct. A number of investigations have been initiated (and sustained) regarding incidents from Oct. - Dec., 2008, including alleged falsification of a police report, failure to properly prepare for and testify during a court appearance, failure to report a traffic collision involving a District vehicle, and two incidents of conduct unbecoming.

Three additional investigations, which are ongoing, were initiated from January -April 2009, including an allegation that an officer failed to perform his duties during his shift, and allegations that three officers were absent without leave for 3-7 days. (Rumors estimate four officers absent without leave for at least the past month.)

The Good News. According to Lynn Wolter, because of Chief Harman's work, Kensington now qualifies for FEMA funding. This means that we're qualified to obtain funding for hazard mitigation work and would now be in line to receive funding following a major disaster. Also at Chief Harman's instigation, the first meeting of the Kensington Public Safety Council was held in May. Meetings continue at the Community Center on the 2nd Monday of every month. KPPCSD meetings are now on the 2nd *and 4th* Thursdays.

and limit other negative impacts on the surrounding neighborhood.

The sign is a premature declaration of victory from developers who at every step of the process have ignored input from the residents around them. Doing so has done nothing to advance their plans, yet they continue to claim that a 1983 approval for a very different project somehow applies to their current plans. The County has consistently rejected this, noting that the original plan included turning the adjoining property at 411 Colusa into a parking structure. The neighborhood group I lead seeks reasonable development of the Colusa Circle. We have previously reached agreements with Ed Hammonds and Narsai David to allow other projects on the Circle to move forward. We are not opposed to growth but believe it's important that existing statues, such as the Kensing-





ton View Ordinance, and guidelines on parking be enforced and respected. We hope the owners of 401 Colusa can move beyond the wishful thinking evidenced by their sign and work constructively with the community to find a better solution.



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
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
