In a working agreement that has been in place for decades with the Kensington Police Protection and Community Services District (KPPCSD), our income is derived through KCC and Kensington After School Enrichment Program (KASEP) classes, a 10week Summer Camp, the Kensington *Outlook* (advertising), and through contributions from the community raised at Spring and Fall fund raising events.

Community Center Remodel Postponed

It is with disappointment that we announce that the planned remodel of the Community Center, scheduled for this summer, will have to be postponed. The changes in scope, direction and funding of the project, along with recent demands by the KPPCSD to alter the role of the Kensington Community Council (KCC) have made this necessary.

We would like to thank all of the participants and sponsors who have worked with us over the last nine months. It is our sincere hope that we will be able to move forward with this project once the reasons for our delay have been resolved.

For those of you who are new to Kensington or would appreciate an historical perspective, KCC is a non-profit community service organization that provides an array of educational and recreational bathroom are examples of improvements which have been funded

Measure G Wins

While all absentee ballots will not be counted for another two or three weeks, barring any unexpected surprises, and with all the other votes having been tallied, *Measure G*, the initiative that increases the annual Kensington police tax up to \$200 per parcel, appears to have passed by a 70% to 30% margin, with 964 votes in favor and 408 opposed. (A 2/3 majority was required for passage.) Sponsors of the measure, backed by assurances from KPPCSD General Manager and Chief of Police, Greg Harman, promise that this will put the District on firmer financial footing, and prevent any reduction in police protection.

Response to "Raise the Rent"

I write in response to Phillip Zimmermann's letter, Raise the Rent, in the June Outlook. The letter stated that the KCC runs programs at the Community Center at a "profit." While technically correct, the KCC regards the profit as surplus funds to be reinvested in the community. The construction of Building E, a wonderful and well-used asset, was paid for by such funds, as were the park and the playground.

Regarding the proposed remodel of the Community Center, Mr. Zimmermann correctly asserted that the first priority should be necessary maintenance. This is also the position of the KCC, and no work would have proceeded without first assuring that the building was sound and had adequate drainage. The remodel has been put on hold for the time being. It would have made the building far more attractive and rentable at an increased rate, funds that would have helped to pay for the construction.

Response to "Eggs in Kensington"

Dear Outlook,

It was with a mixture of humor and disbelief that I read the letter in the May Outlook titled "He's an Eggs-istentialist," advocating the changing of zoning regulations to allow bees and chickens to be kept by local residents.

Some years ago two of my Kensington neighbors kept bees. On three occasions my house was swarmed. Once, a hive relocated inside the walls of my home. I remember hearing the bees and noticing how warm the wall was getting. The beekeeper I hired told me they were making honey. On two other occasions I had hundreds of bees in my living room. I had a young child at home at the time who found this disconcerting. On a fourth occasion I observed my neighbor's apple tree being swarmed. It was like watching a thirty-foot high cyclone. I'm glad his kids weren't playing in the yard when that happened. I also do not miss the dozen or so bees that came to visit every time I would have a meal on my deck.

at dawn clucking around a few feet from your window, then so are you, especially if you're a light sleeper.

I would hope that Mr. Eggs and the Zoning Commission do their research before proceeding further. Kensington is a sub-urban density residential town - not a farm community. However, if in its wisdom the Zoning Commission decides to allow bees and chickens into residential neighborhoods, then I would like to keep a bull in my garage. Think of the benefits of having freshly slaughtered, pesticide free meat, right here on our properties! And I want a rooster too! Imagine the stories these two

Chickens? No Cluckin' Way!

I am writing in response to Russell Brent's Letter to the Editor published May, 2010. Mr. Brent expressed an interest in keeping chickens and bees in his back vard, and seeks to connect with other residents that share that interest. If enough support is garnered, they would look to potentially amend the Kensington Overlay Ordinance allowing residents to keep small a flocks of fowl and beehives.

I too thought of keeping chickens. Last fall I asked a couple of long time residents very familiar with Kensington's workings if residents could keep chickens in Kensington. It never occurred to me it was not legal. The answer I got was, "yes, if you keep them quietly, and, no roosters." I did not have time to clarify what that meant when I started to hear loud squawkings in my neighborhood. While the noise was not 24/7, when it did come, it was very loud and lasted a long time. I am 25% deaf in my right ear, and have a pretty decent set



of insulated glass windows, and at times I was awaken in the morning by chickens.

It took me 2-1/2 months to find out where they lived - three houses away on a different block. They are 100-140 feet away. The sound carries far!

I contacted the owners and asked them to abate it. My understanding is that they pared back the flock. I still hear them, but it is not as bad as it was.

You wouldn't think it, but chickens, not just roosters, can be really loud. I don't know if it is related to how sound ricochets on my block, the size of the flock kept, the breed, predators...I have no idea. But if Mr. Brent's group is to go forward, it seems they will have to address noise concerns.


And Now – Plant Thieves!

KCC SUMMER CAMP

Located in the East Bay hills at 59 Arlington Avenue in Kensington, the Kensington Community Council (KCC) Summer Day Camp is for children entering first through sixth grades in Fall 2010.

The camp runs June 14 through August 20, 2010, Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Campers may enroll on a weekly basis. The price for one week of camp is \$205 (except Week 4, July 6-9, \$160).

Our camp has a maximum of 62 children per week. We employ one director, a head counselor, eight counselors, a tennis instructor, and a "specialty consultant" to work with the campers.

The camp director and head counselor also provide extended day care 8:00-9:00am and 5:00-5:30pm for an additional fee of \$7 per day. (7:30-9am and 5-6pm available for \$10 per day.)



Many Paths to Tread...


...and in Kensington, they could use some sprucing up! When Kensington's residential lots and streets were *platted* (a map, drawn to scale, showing the divisions of a piece of land) in 1911; the paths were included and offered for dedication to the County, but the County never accepted them. Neither do the paths belong to the

lots adjacent to them. As no one owns these paths, they are haphazardly maintained.

There are 12 segments to this path system, comprised of trails and stairs. These paths are used by a number of Kensington residents regularly, as shortcuts to traverse the hilly terrain to get to the Arlington shops, the #7 bus stop, or as the means for an enjoyable stroll away from traffic. The Kensington Improvement Club needs volunteers to weed and trim the overgrown shrubs, on Saturday July 24, from 10am-Noon. Kensington Elementary Makes a BIG Difference in Haiti

This spring, students at Kensington Elementary, with the support of teachers, staff and parents, raised over \$8,000 for Berkeley's *What If? Foundation*, to help feed children in post-earthquake Haiti. The students initiated bake sales and a walk-a-thon, collected loose change, sold t-shirts, and even gathered proceeds from a play, all to benefit the children in Haiti. On June 9th, Margaret Trost, Founder and Executive Director of the What If? Foundation, came to thank students and talk with them about the foundation's work in Haiti.

Tre Curran, a parent who volunteered many

hours in support of the student's efforts, acknowledged Principal Judy Sanders for her commitment to having the children support a local organization in a way that would allow them to connect "beyond just writing checks." Margaret Trost said she was so touched by all the students had done, and said the funds they raised would make a tremendous difference in the lives of children in Port-au-Prince. The What If? Foundation has been feeding and educating impoverished children in Port-au-Prince for over 10 years, and has been providing up to 15,000 meals to hungry children and some adults each week since the earthquake struck on January 12th.







2010-1745 – On 5-1-2010, at approximately 1958 hours, Officer Medina took a coroner's case in the unit block of Edgecroft Road.



With that background information, a significant reason why the project had to be postponed was due to the uncertainties created by recent demands that KCC sign a lease agreement with KPPCSD, seeking to replace the current working agreement, citing that the fees which KCC pays each year are not at a "fair market rate" and represent a "subsidy," which can only be remedied through an increase in our annual stipend. The proposed increase, presented to KCC on May 19, 2010, based on unsubstantiated estimates provided by their legal counsel, would result in a 400% increase in fees per annum for the next five years.

Such an increase would most assuredly result in either having to substantially raise fees charged to members of the

Kensington Education Foundation Needs Your Help

Due to California's continuing budget crisis, the West Contra Costa Unified School District (WCCUSD) faces additional cuts in order to balance its budget for the coming school year. State funds previously used to help pay for reading and math intervention programs at Kensington Elementary Hilltop School (Hilltop) will not be available in 2010-2011.

The Kensington Education Foundation (KEF), a 501c3 non-profit, continues to finance academic enrichment at Hilltop through its annual fundraisers – Garden Party, Fall Pledge, Spell-a-thon, and Community Fundraising. Since 1983, KEF-sponsored programs have expanded to provide Kensington's elementary-aged children the educational offerings that used to be the standard public elementary school experience.

In addition to supporting reading and math intervention programs, KEF funds instructors and supplies for science lab, computer lab, art, and P.E. for grades K-6; vocal music for grades K-3; and roughly 75% of the school library budget. KEF also provides Hilltop teachers with stipends to pay for basic classroom supplies and pays for a credentialed teacher to assist in adminis-



community to use facilities which are supported by tax revenues or, given the fragile economy, a reduction in the type and scope of the KASEP and KCC classes, all of which are considered important by the parents and children of Kensington.

We do not want to create an adversarial relationship with KPPCSD. The KCC Board has made a commitment to work with the District to reach an agreement that is equitable to both parties and beneficial to the community.
