Along with the traditional outside lights and front porch vigils, on August 2nd Kensington will once again celebrate National Night Out with block parties and cookouts.

Directors Rumble – Bay View Takes Toys and Goes Home ... **Rate Increase Denied**

JUNE'S PROPOSITION 218 HEARING

"I don't do business with anybody with a gun to my head." – KPPCSD President Toombs in reference to the request from Bay View for reassignment of the waste hauling contract to another company. "Stay outa my face!" - Director Metcalf to Director Lipscomb. "Get some medication!" - Director Kosel to Nicki Kaiser. Chuck told Cathie she was going to have to stay after the meeting and bang the erasers – or words to that effect – and Bay View Refuse basically told Kensington to "Take this job and shove it!" (though not in so many words).


Such was the level of discourse at the June 9th KPCSD meeting and 218 Hearing regarding the rate increase requested by Bay View Refuse – a meeting full of surprises.

In congruence with the terms of the contact between Bay View and KPPCSD, and at a cost of thousands of dollars, KPPCSD had scheduled the hearing in response to Bay View's rate request. (Interestingly, Bay View can pass on its cost of negotiations [lawyers, etc.], successful or not, to the rate base as an operating expense and then through a quirk of the contract in place, ask for a 12% profit on that expense.)

Halfway through the hearing, and prior to Board discussion leading to a vote on the issue, Bay View owner, Lew Figone, and his representatives apparently sensed things weren't trending their way, submitted a letter to the District requesting assignment of the waste hauling contract to another provider - Republic Services, Inc., and abruptly left the hearing. (Republic Services is a nationwide company which handles refuse pick up for other cities in the Bay Area, including Richmond, El Cerrito, and Piedmont.)

Prior to Board discussion and the vote, Kensington resident, Nicki Kaiser asked Director Cathie Kosel to recuse herself from voting on the matter (a request which Cathie refused). In May,

Bye Bye, Bay View

Dear Editor:

At the June 9 meeting, the KPPCSD Board of Directors voted 3 to 2 to deny a rate increase to Bay View Refuse. As a result, President Lewis Figone of Bay View has given (not sold) the franchise to Republic Services, a large corporation based in Phoenix, Arizona comprised of 348 hauling companies and 31,000 employees. Republic is obligated to operate the franchise under the same contract that Kensington has with Bay View. The contract allows a 12% annual profit on net revenues.

Mr. Figone has been serving Kensington for approximately 60 years and he had negotiated a \$48 tipping fee (i.e. dump fee) per ton. Republic must pay \$150 per ton. The higher tipping fee will result in higher costs for the hauler. Higher costs are passed on to ratepayers. We can expect an approximate 20% near term increase in our rates because of our contractual obligation to allow the 12% profit on net operating expenses. I believe this action by the board was shortsighted and poorly reasoned.

Dear Editor:

The KPPCSD Board believes that increasing speed and poor driving are major traffic safety issues in Kensington. We have faced serious traffic safety issues from residents on The Arlington who have had cars flip into their front yards, to neighbors on other streets who may not be nimble enough to dodge a speeding car or old enough to know when to do so. Accordingly our Board imposed a zero tolerance policy to provide increased public safety.

We as a board have decided that traffic

In May, Chief Harman, Temporary Acting Sergeant Hui, Officer Martinez, Reserve Officer Armanino, and Greg's son, Dakota Harman, all participated in the Walnut Creek Police Department St. Baldrick's Event, which had volunteers soliciting donations for shaving their heads. While some of us do that every morning for free – and many others no longer need to worry about that sort of thing at all, Team Kensington raised over \$1,500 and the entire event raised \$45,000 for children's cancer research.





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Are Traffic Enforcement **Efforts Working?**

In early 2010, the University of California, Institute of Transportation Studies, Technology Transfer Program, completed a complementary Kensington Traffic Safety Evaluation for the District. Based on the recommendation of the report, at the May 13, 2010 KPPCSD Board meeting, the District's Board of Directors voted to accept the recommendation of a "Zero Tolerance Policy" for traffic enforcement in the District. Since that time, we have been reporting and advising the community that we were moving toward such a "Zero Tolerance Policy."

As we began the New Year, our police officers implemented a Zero Tolerance Policy, making traffic enforcement stops for both driving and vehicle mechanical violations, and issuing citations rather than warnings.

dents that occur in a community. If you were to compare the first quarter of 2010 when we had 8 traffic accidents, to the first quarter of 2011 when we had 6 accidents, that would be a 25% reduction in traffic accidents since we implemented a "Zero Tolerance Policy" in traffic enforcement. If this is a trend that continues through the remaining part of the year, a 25% decrease in traffic accidents would seem to be a successful result of our efforts to improve traffic safety in the community.

How To Avoid Receiving a Citation

Drive at or under the speed limit of 25 mph, stop at the stop signs, stop at the traffic light, adhere to the rules of the road, keep your vehicle registered and insured, and have all of your vehicle's equipment working properly. If you follow these rules, you will not receive a traffic citation from a Kensington police officer.

(And stay off your cell phone while driving!)

According to Chief of Police, Greg Harman, following the March 10th KPPCSD Board meeting, in which the Board directed Jerry Fahy of the County's Public Works Department to install the solar powered radar sign at 34 Arlington in order to mitigate speeding traffic through the curve just south of that point, Arlington Avenue resident, Samane Nili contacted the Contra Costa County Public Works Director in protest, halting the installation. Samane was granted a public hearing before the Contra Costa County Board of Supervisors that was scheduled for Tuesday, June 21st, to protest the installation of the sign in the location across the street from their residence. However, she has since pulled her request and has agreed to the installation on a "look and see" type of evaluation. The pole has been cut to tree level and the County is making custom light baffles for the sign to reduce whatever light may have been directed at the Nili residence.

'Food Explorers' Break Ground at Hilltop Elementary


As one resident and traffic safety activist on Franciscan Way has said, our police

Nicki had discovered that Cathie, despite previous assurances to the contrary, had once been the recipient of a large campaign contribution from Lewis Figone, the owner and sole shareholder of Bay View.

(At the April KPPCSD meeting, Nicki had asked Cathie about her prior association with Figone and Cathie had said she "...did not really know Lewis Figone until only recently when [she had taken] a seat on the Board and begun asking around about him."

Upon further questioning at the May KPPCSD meeting, Cathie retracted her previous statement and said she had "... actually received a contribution of \$99 from Mr. Figone, while other candidates running against me [for EC City Council] had received \$1,000 each."

A campaign disclosure form filed by Cathie when she ran for public office in El Cerrito in the late 1980's revealed, however, that Figone actually made a \$500 campaign contribution to her during her election – well in excess of the amount Cathie claimed he had contributed to her campaign at the May meeting. Records at El Cerrito City Hall do not show any other candidate having received a \$1,000 contribution from Mr. Figone, as Cathie had stated.)

Following further public comment on the rate increase, Chuck Toombs read Bay View's letter to all present, and then the Board, voted to deny the rate increase request, by a 3-2 margin.

KPPCSD's rate reviewer and attorney are now reviewing Bay View's request for assignment with regard to what the next steps might be for KPPCSD, in light of the contract terms. Assuming all is in order, the Board will review Republic, Inc.'s suitability as a replacement. Bay View has requested the change of service take place no later than January 1st, 2012. Chuck also invited Bay View (in absentia) to mittee, Cathie and Mari Metcalf, nor Bay View have recently attended) with hopes for an agreement that would allow Bay View to continue service.

Some residents fear that, if Bay View is no longer the carrier, the "tipping fee" the company had negotiated with the County – which entitles Bay View to substantially lower dumping rates than other waste disposal companies (including Republic) – may lead to increased fees passed on to Kensington ratepayers by a new hauler, once the current contract expires.

Opponents of the rate increase reiterated that the proposed increase wouldn't just have raised fees, but would have modified the rate structure in ways that would have virtually annihilated the mini-can program, implemented in 1990 to comply with the County's state-mandated Waste Reduction Plan (which pre-dates the current Bay View contract by many years.)

Bay View's audited financial statements for 2010 show a net profit of approximately \$25K, while Director Lipscomb pointed out that this did not include *affiliated income*, such as green waste disposal receipts, collected rents, debris box rentals, executive compensation, and depreciation, all of which, when added in, show a yield of over \$300K on \$1M revenue for the year (a figure disputed by Bay View).

Epilogue: Adding injury to insult, the week following the hearing, families on Beverly Court, a cul-de-sac off Ardmore, received a notice from Bay View informing them that, "...after today's collection (6/17) it will be necessary to place you(r) refuse and recycling containers at the main street where it will be serviced by the regular collection truck. Our contract with the district does not call for a small service vehicle to provide service on a street which our regular route collection vehicle is unable to drive on (*sic*)."
