National Night Out celebrations involve literally millions of people in thousands of communities from all fifty states, as well as Canadian cities, and U.S. territories and military bases, worldwide.

The intent of this annual communitybuilding campaign is to: (1) Heighten crime prevention awareness; (2) Generate support for, and participation in, local anti-crime programs; (3) Strengthen neighborhood spirit and police-community partnerships; and (4) Send a message to criminals letting them know that neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.

Cash Mob!

July at Kensington Chevron

A *cash mob* is a group of people that assembles at a local business to make purchases. The purpose of these "mobs" is to support both the local businesses and the overall community. They may also serve a secondary purpose in providing social opportunities. They are a form of *flash mob*, and are inspired by them. The cash mob is also related to *carrotmob*, which supports companies for ethical, mainly pro-environmental actions.

As reported by Public Radio International, the idea of a cash mob was first started by Chris Smith, a blogger and engineer from Buffalo, New York, in August 2011. He reportedly organized more than 100 people to purchase items from a local wine shop. Smith described the mobs as *reverse Grou-*

Editor:

During a recent weekend afternoon, KPD Sergeant Ricky Hull, in his cruiser just off Arlington Avenue, put aside his radar gun and joined me in active pursuit of our runaway dog. For what seemed a very long time, Sgt. Hull and I, on foot and by car, traversed much of northeast Kensington. My dog, probably on the scent of one of the deer that challenge him at our fence-line, finally tired sufficiently to be caught.

Without the immediate and persistent participation of Sgt. Hull, either the dog or I, or maybe both, would have expired. Sgt. Hull brought compassion and considerable energy to a task that might not appear as a chapter heading in the Police Training Manual, but which for THIS Kensington family prevented a loss as severe and unsettling as a home burglary or car theft.

I thought about Sgt. Hull as I re-read an old Outlook article on the still-simmering KPD compensation issue. I don't think guys like Hull end up on certain police forces by accident. Many of us have met the other sort elsewhere. For this family, whatever combination of factors — compensation/benefits, management style and priorities — permits maintenance of the institutional culture I saw demonstrated by Sgt. Hull are OK.

KPPCSD Budget

Editor:

A proposed budget was presented to the KPPCSD Board May 14. It was noted that salaries are the major part of the budget: 35% of the \$2,627,210 budget with another 35% for benefits. It was then noted that there was nothing to do about those numbers, as they were set under a negotiated contract.

The district now pays the 9% employee contribution to PERS - \$83,583 for 2013-14. The board is currently negotiating the renewal of the police contract. The board should ask the police to start contributing their share to their pensions as most government employees do. This does not have to be done all at once, but can be done over the course of a few years. This would be sufficient to buy all the toilet paper we need.

Every government agency is under increasing pressure to make ends meet. Many programs and staff have been cut. It is time that the police accept that they need to make a contribution to this effort.

Yes – they put their lives at risk. They are already well compensated for that risk with generous salary & a very generous retirement. Note that while the risk to Kensington police is not zero, it is nothing like that of the police in Richmond or Oakland. (We have demographics & geography to thank for that.) I also resent the subtle suggestion by police in general that we will have rampant crime if we do not pay them all they ask for.

Note that the Kensington Police Officers Association contributed \$990 to the Toombs-Gillette campaign. The next biggest was \$500, while Mr. Toombs contributed \$1460. Police officers were also distributing campaign literature for them. I consider it totally improper for Mr. Toombs & Ms. Gillette to be part of the negotiations for the new contract. To avoid any suggestion of impropriety or conflict of interest, they should decline to be part of the negotiations and recuse themselves from voting on the contract.

Writ of Mandate

In response to the letter to the editor in last month's *Outlook*, here are some facts regarding the Petition for Writ of Mandate a group of residents filed in response to violations that occurred at the July 12, 2012 KPPCSD meeting:

1. Director Metcalf, then a sitting Board member, emailed Board President Chuck Toombs, as well as the attorneys for the District, within days of the meeting, advising them that there had been a serious violation of the policies and procedures manual, and that the situation needed to be addressed immediately. The Board had the power to undo its mistake at that time and without cost to anyone. Instead of rec-

KCC introduced automated registration for KCC Summer Camp in March 2013. All families are using the system to register for camp and pay with a credit card, check or cash! KCC is very happy with the results and is now preparing the system for KASEP classes.

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

KPPCSD Board Authorizes Funds for Add'l Study

At a special weekend KPPCSD meeting on June 15th, the Board voted 5 to 0 to approve funding of up to \$24,000 to select a consultant and pay for an "objective, statistically significant" survey of the registered voters to determine what they feel is most important for park building improvements, and to ascertain the level of willingness to support a possible future bond measure to renovate the Community Center. The funding for the survey will come from the \$300,000 dedicated reserves set aside for park buildings.

Move Over, Bo Derek - Kensington Hilltop is a '10'!

Kensington Hilltop School scored 10 out of 10 in the just-released state Academic Performance Index (API) ranking for similar schools. Our school was one of only eight elementary schools in Contra Costa County to receive a "10" in both overall score and similar schools ranking. The other seven schools in the county to receive top scores in both categories are four schools in Orinda, two in Moraga, and Windemere Ranch Middle School in San Ramon.

The state divides all the schools in California evenly, starting with the lowest ten percent and continuing to rank the schools by percent, to the top ten percent. With an API of 956 for the academic year of 2011

-2012, Kensington is in the top 10% of all state schools. Even more impressive, the Department of Education also looks at the makeup of each school's population and the local community and compares our school with 100 schools with the same demographics and challenges. This includes schools in Silicon Valley, Marin, and Piedmont. A school that has a "10" means that the entire school population is doing very well, including English learners and students who qualify for free- and reduced-price lunch. So move over, Bo Derek – Kensington is a perfect '10'!

Toombs refused. Metcalf asked Toombs directly which of the following was the case: did he, as Board President, violate the Policies and Procedures without knowing he had done so, out of ignorance of the rules he was responsible for enforcing, or did he violate the rules willfully? Toombs responded, "I am not going to answer that
- 3. This case could have been resolved before it was even filed, but the Board refused to acknowledge their own errors. The case continues (and continues to cost the District money) because the Board refuses to acknowledge their error. Obviously the current Board thinks it makes sense to continue to fight the case rather than to admit what they did, and make it right. Does that make any sense to anyone?

Kensington Police Dept. Citizens' Academy This Fall

"Well Worth Your Time," Says Previous Attendee

I participated in the first police Citizen's Academy in the fall of 2011. Lead by Officer Wilson, it was the first time the Kensington Police Department put this program together, and it was fantastic. The Academy includes a wide array of information, from ethics and professional standards through crime scene investigations and traffic enforcement.

Participation in the program gives us "non-sworn" citizens a glimpse into how the police are trained, how they think, and what they look for in Kensington. The program includes elements of overall community safety as well as the importance of officer safety. They even demonstrate how quickly someone can pull out a gun and create a problematic situation (the demo is with fake guns, of course).

Other highlights of the program include learning how crime is categorized, the types of crime in our community, and crime prevention techniques. At the end of the program, there is a "drive along" where you spend time on patrol with an officer, and experience – in real time – what they look for and how they respond

to calls for service.

A wonderful aspect of the program is that each officer presents a specialty subject where s/he has primary responsibility. It is a great way to meet the officers who patrol our streets and to see how the work in the department is organized. Officers also share their unique experiences related to policing in Kensington.

It's really quite amazing that the police department in a community of our small size values sharing with residents what it does and it's done. The Citizen's Academy is based on the fact that an informed community working in collaboration with the police and their neighbors make the entire community safer. I am very proud that this program takes place, and it was well worth my time. No homework and no tests – just two hours a week. Sign up today!

Just In: New AT&T Proposal • KMAC Mtg 7/30

The Dept. of Conservation and Development has received a revised project proposal from New Cingluar Wirelss (AT&T). As proposed, AT&T has reduced the number of proposed sites in the Kensington area from nine to six. According to AT&T, the sites at 8 Highland, 98 Rincon Rd., and 123 Purdue Ave. will be replaced with one "Macro" site in El Cerrito, at the top of Moser Lane. In an attempt to improve the aesthetics and reduce any potential view blockage, five of the remaining six sites within Kensington have been modified. ATT is in the process of tyring to get story poles up on the PGE power lines, and hopes to get them up in time so the public and KMAC can look at them before the meeting. The new proposal is tentatively expected to be presented to the public at the next KMAC meeting, Tuesday, July 30th, at 7pm at the Community Center. 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
