Continuing our annual spring tradition, we'd like to congratulate the graduating high school seniors – those who live in Kensington or who attended Kensington Hilltop Elementary School.



Raise the Rent

Dear Editor:

The Community Center building has many pressing maintenance needs. The KCC pays rent to run its programs in the building, and it does so at a profit. The current management of the KCC has categorically refused to consider that its first priority in spending its money in the Center ought to be for necessary maintenance. Examples of urgently needed repairs are inadequate drainage facilities on the uphill side that allow occasional floods; downspouts and gutters in need of replacement, and shabby exterior paint.

Instead of a fully functional building in good repair, the finished product of the impending remodel the KCC is pushing for the Community Center will mostly be intended to provide "prettier for parties" superficial cosmetic changes to the interior surfaces, such as an impractical wood floor, sheetrock over the cinderblock interior walls, and a wall of French doors we don't need. More is the pity that these expensive changes to the main room will not change its character, which is dominated by the exposed steel trusses that support the roof. No significant changes are planned to them. Granted, there are needed updates planned for the bathrooms. "Needed," and merely "wanted," among the contemplated projects should be ranked, and the "needed" list augmented and fully funded before one dime goes toward the "wanted" list. The alternative is for the building's owners, KPPCSD, at taxpayer expense, to pick up the tab for KCC-ignored repairs.

Measure G - What's at Stake

Are Kensington police officers overpaid? Are they underpaid? Or are they paid appropriately?

One highly respected director of the Kensington Police Protection and Community Services District (KPPCSD) examined currently available compensation data and determined that Kensington officers earn less than officers in most nearby cities. A different director on the same board reviewed a different set of data and concluded that Kensington officers are overpaid.

Inaccuracies in Voter Information Pamphlet?

Dear Editor,

The writers of the *Measure G Rebuttal* made a few mistakes. Our officers are NOT paid 18% more than similar departments: their salaries are below many similar areas, and below El Cerrito and Albany. Our officers' base salary did NOT increase by 28% over the past 5 year – they got 3.8% a year on average, totaling 19%. Social Security cost of living increases over those years averaged 3.64%, totaling 18.2%, so they were right in line with inflation.

In the last 3 years, about 50 houses per year sold. This year, 15 sold as of 5/12/10. Taxes go up when property sells for more than its previous value, but if an owner's child takes title, or if someone over 55 can take their lower tax basis with them, they qualify for NO tax increase due to Prop. 58, 60 or 90! When pre-Prop. 13 houses are sold, more money goes to the District. But under Prop. 13, the District gets only 13 cents of each tax dollar! If you're paying \$2,200 tax per year, only about \$130 of it goes to our police. Add the \$300 assessment passed 16 years ago, and you're still only paying only about \$37 a month, total, for your 24/7 police service. At \$6K/yr, you're paying about \$77/mo. (Take your tax bill, minus assessments, x 13%, + \$300, and divide by 12.

Under Measure G, our Board may levy up to \$200 per parcel – only \$16 a month. If an assessment is not needed, our Board need not declare it due, as did our Fire Board recently. Passing Measure G means that resources will be there to address our current deficit, and for the future. Keep your prop-

Opposition to 'G' Asks to "Negotiate a Fair Deal"


How do you determine what a fair deal is? Compare total compensation packages with those of similar agencies. Specifically, we pay our two sergeants almost \$200K each in total compensation per year. Other officers are proportionally grandly compensated. A respected compensation survey shows that we pay approximately 23% more than El Cerrito and similar cities.

As beneficiaries of *G*, KPD officers could not resist the temptation to claim low salaries in a letter to residents. That is half the truth. Our budget indicates that we pay \$925K a year in police salaries and an additional \$887K in benefits for a total \$1.8million. This means the department pays on average \$201K combined salary and benefits per officer per year. That is huge! And out of control.

There is no cost share for retirement or medical; Kensington pays 100% of the employer and employee share for both. G raises approx \$450K. Officers' share of CalPers is \$83K, almost a fifth of the amount to be raised. Voters should ask KPOA to pay their share like other agencies do. The amount for medical is a staggering \$360K+/year and growing. It went up \$127,000 over 2009 for active members and proportionally for retirees.

In 2008 when KPPCSD knew they had no revenue to pay for it, they gave KPOA 10% raises, while public safety agencies all over the country took cuts during our national fiscal crisis. They also made not one budget cut. Consultant Brown Taylor's report found that our officers have 70% unassigned time. So we added a second

To help fund these repairs, from now on, KCC's rent ought to be set at the amount their programs earn, after all associated Hoping to resolve such controversies, the KPPCSD board is commissioning an independent survey of current police compensation in Bay Area cities similar to Kensington. The Board will use this survey to negotiate police compensation that is fair and equitable. The police salary negotiations are scheduled to take place in June, once the survey is complete.

For several years now, I have attended Police Services District meetings and have become familiar with the issues. As I see it, the bottom line on Measure G is simple: Even without any officer pay increase whatsoever, the KPPCSD board is facing a serious budget shortfall that can only be resolved by increasing the police tax or, alternatively, by cutting police patrol shifts.

This is not fear mongering. It is common sense. I encourage Kensington residents who wish to continue to enjoy low crime rates and 24/7 neighborhood patrol services to VOTE YES ON MEASURE G.

Yvonne Selde, 1922-2010

Yvonne Selde, a Kensington resident for 44 years, died at Aldersly Retirement Home in San Rafael on March 10, 2010

Growing up on a ranch in eastern Washington, Yvonne rode her horse to school and always preferred tools to toys. In WWII she worked in a Seattle military aviation plant before going on to earn a BS degree in Civil Engineering at the University of Washington and beginning her career as a structural engineer in California. Early work experiences included industrial building design, aircraft wing design (the F89F) and bridge design. Her first bridges were a pedestrian overpass and two road bridges over the Mountain Boulevard Freeway in Oakland (highway13.) Traveling north to south it is plain to see a young engineer's growing confidence in her ability and her authority.

Ms. Selde worked for some years in Los Angeles for the L.A. School District and for the California Division of Highways, before moving to Kensington and accepting a position with Naval Facilities Engineering Command in San Bruno. The wide variety of responsibilities there allowed her to hone her expertise in structural and hydraulic engineering, soil mechanics and nuclear shielding, and spared her what she perceived to be the drudgery of doing the same thing twice. Notable during her years with the Navy was an assignment at Mare Island. Defects had been reported in a crane used to load nuclear material onto Polaris submarines. It was Ms.

Selde's responsibility to condemn the crane, for which she was fired by the commanding officer but immediately reinstated and thanked in a personal phone call from Admiral Rickover.

Ms. Selde continued to work for the Navy until her retirement for health reasons in 1982. She was a longstanding member of the Structural Engineers' Association of Northern California, and in 1959 was the first woman engineer admitted to membership in the Association's Southern California chapter. In her early career she was the first woman structural engineer wherever she worked. She was deeply gratified to see the progress made by women in her profession.

Ms. Selde is pre-deceased by her husband Ponciano Cruzata (1905 – 1951). She is survived by her brother, Vernon Selde, of Walla Walla, WA, by nephews Peter and William, of Albuquerque NM and Omaha NE, and by nieces Cynthia and Lynda, of Walla Walla and New York City.

Frances Desire Hanna, 1908--2010

Frances died of natural causes on April 4th at her home in Kensington. She was preceded in death by her beloved husband, Warren L. Hanna. She is survived by daughters Sally Stevenson of Lincoln, CA, Jean Offholter of Reston, VA, and Marilyn Johnson of Calistoga, CA; five grandchildren, six greats and three great-greats. She was born in Iowa and raised in Pasadena, CA. She obtained her Registered Nurse certificate from Huntington Memorial Hospital, married Dr. C.B. Hills, moved to Berkeley, had two daughters, and she started her many years of volunteerism at Alta Bates Hospital. During WWII she was employed by the Red Cross training nurse's aides. Once the war was over, so was her marriage. In 1947 she met and married Warren Hanna. With her two daughters and Warren's daughter, Marilyn, they became a blended family. She was associated with The Berkeley City Club, Hillside Club, Arlington Women's Club, East Bay Fan Club, YMCA Seniorcize Aerobics and the Unitarian Universalist Church of Berkeley in Kensington. 




