Park Buildings Committee Update



Protect Your Home and Community From Wildfire

Advisory From El Cerrito/Kensington Fire Chief, Lance Maples

Summer is upon us, and that means fire season is in full swing. With the risk that our community faces from a wildland interface fire it is imperative that we embrace vegetation management to reduce the fire hazard in the community of Kensington.

As we look outside and see our surrounding vegetation becoming golden brown we realize that the risk of wildfire exists not only for property owners, but also for our community as a whole.

Wildfires often begin unnoticed and can spread quickly, igniting brush, trees and homes. Below are a few simple things you can do to prevent wildfires and promote overall fire safety in our community.

· Design and landscape your home with wildfire safety in mind. Select materials and plants that can help contain fire rather than fuel it. Plant fire resistant shrubs and

• Use fire resistant or non-combustible materials on roofs and exteriors of all buildings.

- · Clear all flammable vegetation such as dry grass or weeds.
- Prune tree branches and shrubs within 10 feet of a stovepipe or chimney outlet.
- Place fireplace and grill ashes in a metal container with a tight lid.
- · Store gasoline, oily rags and other flammable materials in approved containers.
- Teach children about fire safety. Keep matches and lighters out of their reach.
- Regularly clean your roof and gutters.

It is the responsibility of each property owner to ensure their property is fire safe and to make certain there is a reduced risk in our community.





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Rate Review for 2014 – No Increase for 2013

Earlier this year, KPPCSD and Bay View Refuse participated in an arbitration, as required under BVR's contract, to resolve a dispute regarding its rates. The arbitrator found that BVR was not entitled to a rate increase in 2013, as it claimed, but that it was entitled to receive a comprehensive rate review in 2013 to establish and set rates for 2014, pursuant to the terms of the contract. As the franchise fees the District receives have already been exhausted through previous legal costs of doing business with Bay View, the cost of the review – not to exceed \$28.5K – in this case will ultimately be paid by the District.



DAYS ON MARKET

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Writ of Mandate Defense Costs Climbing Past \$38K

As reported in the March 2013 edition of the Outlook, seven (formerly nine) Kensington residents, headed by Leonard Schwartzburd, Ph.D., represented by a reported two-person legal team headed by Mari Metcalf, Esq. (who was a KPPCSD Director at the time of the disputed action last year), are suing the Kensington Police Protection and Community Services District (KPPCSD), and three of the directors - Richard (Tony) Lloyd, Chuck Toombs, and Linda Lipscomb, individually.

The plaintiffs are asking that the KPPCSD Board be directed to vacate its July 2012 vote to increase COP/GM, Greg Harman's compensation package, enjoin any gift of public funds, such as they claim was awarded to Harman in retroactive pay, and that costs of suit and attorney fees be awarded to the petitioners.

According to Harman, legal fees paid by the District to defend that suit, through March 30th, had reached \$38,000.

While opinions on the merits of the case differ, many in Kensington feel that, in this time of austerity, the costs to the community of such legal action outweigh anything that might be gained by pursuing the matter in court. The cost of the defense comes out of the pockets of all Kensington residents.

Based on the initial draft of the 2013-14 Police Dept. budget presented at May's KPPCSD meeting, without additional funds, the District will need to dip into its reserves to run the department in the coming year.

The budget projected a deficit of \$50K-\$150K (depending on the receipt of a hoped for, but not guaranteed \$100K COPS grant) - a shortfall expected to limit everything from ammunition to toilet paper. ("One of the most depressing budgets I've ever seen," said KPPCSD President, Tony Lloyd. When asked if he could run the department with the projected shortfalls, COP, Greg Harman said, "It would be like pulling a rabbit out of a hat.")

Increasing the amount of Measure G funds

to be collected from Kensington homeowners in the coming year – an option that was approved by the measure (which supplements the share of property taxes that goes to pay for operating expenses of the police department) – was put forth as one way to cover the expected budget shortfall.

The \$38,000 spent on defending the writ of mandate would have covered 30-80% of that expected shortfall. Other community uses to which such an amount might have been put include:

Purchasing 1,500 books for the Kensington Library; purchasing a new police patrol car and all the equipment that goes with it; or, it could have covered the District's share of the new Calpers increase in the pension rate for all KPD officers.

Judy Sanders, Principal of Kensington Hilltop Elementary said, "Assuming that \$38,000 was donated to the Kensington Education Foundation, it would pay the cost of our reading intervention program for one year, which serves approximately 100 students. Alternatively it could give each teacher approximately \$2,000 to use for classroom supplies and instructional material, or it could cover the cost of sending all of our 6th graders to environmental camp for a week, with money left over."

Fire Chief Lance Maples suggested any of three items in the Fire District's budget could be covered with those funds: 1. The annual maintenance of our two-county radio system (\$35,000); 2. The Fire District's cost share for a grant for Airpacks breathing apparatus for firefighters to carry on their backs (\$40,000); or 3. A year's worth of diesel and unleaded fuel for the Kensington Fire District.

Chris Hall, Market Manager at the Kensington Farmers' Market, also had three ideas about how to spend such a sum: 1. Establish a direct linkup to Hilltop Elementary School to subsidize healthier meals for the kids, with fresh locally grown produce (which would also help



### FAQ's:

1. Why invest in the park buildings now? The Community Center and Annex buildings haven't been renovated in over 30 years and need significant work for continued use. The District developed a Master Plan for the buildings in 2012 that included public meetings and an on-line survey. The final recommendation was to first make critical safety improvements along with other design improvements to the Community Center and create a building that would better serve the entire community and expand existing uses.

2. What are the benefits of the recommended plan? The plan focuses on critical health and safety issues regarding the Community Center. It also modifies the existing building to allow for a greater variety of activities for the community. It improves heating, acoustics and lighting. The design builds in energy efficiencies and uses durable materials that result in cost savings over time. The design celebrates the beautiful park setting by opening the west wall to the outside for indoor/ outdoor flow and creates a clear entry on the South.

*3. How can we pay for this?* Two options were developed – each of which would require 2/3 voter approval:

• General Obligation Bond @ \$9 per \$100,000 of assessed property value, or \$34.50 annually for the median singlefamily residence.

• Special Tax Bond that, if apportioned evenly to every residence in Kensington, would cost approximately \$45.50 each.

4. Who uses the Community Center now? During weekday mornings, there are a variety of adult exercise and art classes. Weekday afternoons offer a variety of Kensington After School Programs (KASEP).

Evening users include Cub Scouts and



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



sustain local small family farms); or 2. Since music has been cut back at schools, many kids come to the Farmers' Market and have their first exposure to live music; with additional funds, Chris said the Farmers' Market could expand its music and arts program – and provide honorariums for speakers to come to the market to talk about nutrition; or 3. The market could sponsor 16 foster families in need, at the rate of \$200/mo, for a year (these are usually kids separated from their family due to abuse in the family).

According to a sampling of the construction estimate in the Master Plan for the Community Center (Option 2 – the Recommended Plan) any of at least four items could be covered within the \$38K amount: 1. Seismic safety improvements and roof repair and resurfacing; 2. Exterior drainage improvements to prevent water penetration into the building; 3. Most of the heating systems for Community Center main meeting room and three smaller meeting rooms; 4. Fire alarm and telecommunication distribution systems.

Additional fees for defense in the writ of mandate case have accrued for April and May, and will, no doubt, continue to do so through the conclusion of the case, which is expected by the end of June.
