We are fearful and quite confident that serious injury or possible death is an imminent threat to our immediate community unless effective traffic-calming measures are implemented as soon as possible."

There is little doubt that something needs to be done to prevent future accidents at the curve in the road in front of 46 Arlington Avenue. # **Calm the Traffic, Calm the Neighbors**

January 22nd, 2010...3:30pm – the day after little Jack's 3rd birthday. Kathy Maguire and her two children had just come home through this gate to their home at 46 Arlington Avenue an hour earlier, and the kids were taking their afternoon nap when the accident happened – just one of several serious accidents, and numerous less serious accidents, at this same location over the past decade.

In a letter a year ago to the Contra Costa County Board of Supervisors, County Public Works Dept., the Kensington Police Protection and Community Services District, and Chief of Police, Greg Harman, Jack's mother Kathy, and father, Patrick, said, "While we have sustained sub-

speed, with the intention of slowing traffic in the straightaway as it heads south toward the apparently dangerous curve at 46 Arlington.

According to a petition distributed to Arlington neighbors by the Maguires, it's especially critical to slow down traffic in this area as these sidewalks and crosswalks represent a high pedestrian traffic area. Each of the four most recent car accidents occurring at 46 Arlington Avenue has resulted in a speeding car jumping the sidewalk. Near schools, the library, the park and community center, and Arlington Church, pre-school and

It is a framework for employment in which all females and males are treated equally. Gender equity is a value of our great democracy.

There has been no female patrol officer in Kensington for approximately two years. Prior to that, the well-respected Sgt. Angela Escobar served our community for 10 years. Chief Harman "encouraged" her to leave. I believe that the current management of the KPPCSD may be guilty of gender discrimination; the lack of a single female on patrol probably supports my assertion. This discrimination is not subtle, and it is a significant deficiency for our community in the management of any issues involving females. Our police department administration should be held accountable for what appears to be discrimination. To have only one woman on the force for the entire decade of 2000-2010 is indefensible in itself. To now have ZERO female officers is just not acceptable.

elementary school students and parents, senior citizens, joggers, church members, and other pedestrians depend on the sidewalks in this area.

After extensive research by the Contra Costa Department of Public Works and the Kensington Police Department, including surveying of the road curvature and banking along Arlington Avenue and installation of a temporary radar trailer, it was determined that a combination of the following traffic calming measures were necessary to help reduce the dangerous condition on Arlington Avenue: Re-striping of the road prior to the dangerous "S" curve near Cowper Ave., police monitoring and ticketing of speeders on Arlington Avenue in the area between the north and south Rincon Road intersections and

Arlington Avenue, and installation of a permanent solar radar speed sign prior to the dangerous 'S' curve.

The first two trafficcalming measures have been implemented, and the solar radar speed sign is ready to be installed. The radar speed sign was pre-approved, then funded by the Kensington Police Protection and Community District Services (KPPCSD) in June 2010, and purchased soon thereafter. The pole that will hold the sign was installed in

December 2010. The sign's installation has been delayed by Kensington resident, Samane Nili's concerns over the conclusions of the traffic study, her claimed lack of proper process and neighborhood notification, and concerns that her view will be obstructed by the sign.

Samane and her husband moved to Kensington in March of last year, and maintain that they never received notice of the neighborhood meetings regarding the traffic problem. They recently returned from vacation to discover that a tall pole had been installed directly across the street from their house - a pole installed for the purpose of hosting a flashing radar speed sign – with what is anticipated to be dramatic negative impact on their view of the bay.

At last month's KPPCSD meeting,

Samane gave what appeared to be wellresearched presentation, backed by photos, charts, and graphs, showing why the County proposal is, she claims, not the best solution to the problem.

According to County traffic engineer, Jerry Fahy, the pole, along with its proposed radar speed sign, was not placed arbitrarily, but rather at the location along the road at which traffic management principles indicate it would do the most good. Other signage, speed bumps, etc., were also considered, and the radar speed sign judged to be the most effective for this application. He says there is not a lot of history for situations like this, however, as it is rare for such a major thoroughfare to pass through a residential neighborhood.

Samane, an architect, has researched the topic, only to arrive at a different conclusion. "(While) our

> view was the initial motivation for my research," she says, "...the proposed solution has far more impact than disturbing our view and the light pollution that we (would) get from it; it is against the code and scientific research; it is a costly solution for our neighborhood, (which can be expected to have) minimum effect."

According to Samane, "(t)he County has not followed the legal procedure for adding

this element in this neighborhood; the proposed solution should have been reviewed by the planning department in a public meeting; and public notification should have been sent out.

Recently installed sign pole on the southwest

corner of Arlington Ave. and Rincon Drive

"We have never been notified about any meetings pertaining to the installation of the 25-foot post in front of our house (a fait accompli). We see the post and the sign from our bedroom, living room and dining room, and it intrudes on the limited view we have of San Francisco. The light pollution from the (proposed) sign constantly flashing will also be very disturbing. (The Maguires state that flyers were distributed to all Arlington neighbors prior to each meeting that was held to address the traffic safety problem.)

Samane goes on to assert that "(t)he

problem for this stretch of Arlington really stems from the lack of proper signage and conformance to the standards recommended by the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD). According to the widely accepted research that was done nationally, the costly radar speed sign solution which has been proposed (has a) minor effect in reducing speed in residential neighborhoods, except school zones, and is usually applied only as a temporary solution in problem areas. Bringing the curve up to the current code and MUTCD standards by installing adequate signage (orange and black warning signs for a turn) would be the first and necessary step for controlling the speed and improving safety at this stretch of Arlington."

Meanwhile, during the preparation of this article, the Outlook received a call from the Maguires; there had been another accident in front of their house. Also today, the sun is out, the sky is blue, and the views of the bay from Kensington homes along the Arlington, spectacular.

According to Jerry Fahy, the decision about whether to install the radar sign rests with KPPCSD. The issue will be discussed further, and possibly decided upon, at March's KPPCSD meeting on Thursday, March 10th, at 7pm at the Community Center, public welcome, as always.- Ed.
