District to decide May 1 if Hilltop opens on time

West Contra County Unified School District staff are scheduled to decide by May 1 whether the reconstructed Hilltop Elementary School will be completed in time for the start of the 2005 - 2006 school year.

Construction crews ran into delays on the renovation of the main structure as a result of heavy rains during the winter. The district is considering postponing the return of students to the school by as much as three weeks.

Though three weeks is not a lot of time, such a delay would mean teachers will not have the summer to pack up their temporary classrooms at Portola.

Instead, they would need to leave their current classrooms in place for the start of the 2005-2006 school year and then have just a weekend to move their classrooms

and set them up in the renovated and expanded campus up the hill.

Bill Savidge, engineering officer with the school district, said the district must decide now about whether to delay the return to Hilltop so teachers won't have to stow away their classrooms at the end of the year only to have to unpack and set them up again in the portables if they determine later a delay is unavoidable.

"Right now we are not ready to make a decision," he said. "We are assessing the process. It could go either way."

Kensington principal Jon Stokes said he believes a delay is unnecessary based on his discussions with the construction manager on the project. He said he is pushing the district to keep the project on schedule and allow teachers to move in as planned for the beginning of the school year. "That's not making the staff happy. We don't think that's a very good idea," he said. "It means we're going to have to pack everything up on a weekend and move. That's not smart."

The \$15 million reconstruction and expansion of Hilltop school began last summer and required temporarily moving students to a makeshift campus made up of portable classrooms on the Portola Middle School blacktop.

When completed, the project will provide a new 11,000 square foot building to house the library, music, science and art programs.

The project also includes the addition of 1,700 square feet of space to the main building, modernization of existing classrooms and renovation of the multipurpose room and kitchen.

during the school's annual science fair. The event is intended to give children an early and positive experience with science.

Science as child's play

Nursery school science fair shows it doesn't take a rocket scientist to figure out how to get a four-year-old interested in rocket science.

On May 14, the Kensington Nursery School will hold its 15th annual science fair. It is believed to be the only nursery school in the area to hold an annual science fair.

The event, which draws about 200 people each year, is aimed at providing kids with an early and fun exposure to the world of science.

Scher and neighbors don't want a new ordinance

A proposed Contra Costa County ordinance that would allow, but limit, fundraising concerts at the home of concert promoter turned philanthropist Danny Scher has led to a rare moment of accord between Scher and his neighbors.

Following a special session of the Kensington Municipal Advisory Council where residents discussed the ordinance, Scher and Toni Folger Brown of the Coventry Neighborhood both said they would prefer to let existing law resolve the controversy.

However, the two disagreed about the problems with the latest effort by supervisor John Gioia to craft a law that would provide a peaceable solution to the controversy over the events.

The Coventry Neighborhood Group, which

has characterized the concerts as commercial in nature and inappropriate for a residential neighborhood, drafted a detailed critique of the ordinance. It recommended several changes including greater limits on the number and size of events allowed under the ordinance.

If passed, the law would permit up to four events a year with as many as 300 people at two events and up to 200 people at two others. It would also limit the number of events to two if a property owner held four the previous year.

Scher, though, called the ordinance "overly harsh and punitive" and said there is a system already in place within the county to address the problem.

The county fined Scher a total of \$800 for

three events it said he held without obtaining a necessary land use permit. Scher contends the events don't require a land use permit because they represent a reasonable use of a person's home. After unsuccessfully appealing the fines with the county, Scher has taken the county to Superior Court to challenge the fines.

Ray Barraza, chairman of the Kensington Municipal Advisor Council, said the group will make recommendations to the county in May about how to improve on the draft ordinance.

"An ordinance, modified and improved, is an avenue to getting rid of the problem," he said. "The intent is not to put Danny out of business, but to work with the neighborhood find a solution."
