#### **Writ Now Before Court of Appeal**

Decision on anti-SLAPP Motion Expected by June 30

In October 2012, a Petition for Writ of Mandate and for Declaratory and Injunctive Relief was filed in the Superior Court of California, Contra Costa County, by former KPPCSD Director, Mari Metcalf, Esq. on behalf of plaintiffs, Leonard Schwartzburd, Schwartzburd's wife, Dairlyn Chelette, Mabry Benson, Catherine De Neergaard, Metcalf's husband, Jeffrey Koehler, Celia Concus, former KPPCSD Director Cathie Kosel, Llewellyn Stanton, and Eyleen Nadolny (treasurer of Kosel's and Jim Hansen's 2012 KPPCSD campaign committee). (For unknown reasons, Koehler's name was removed from the petition in November 2012, prior to its presentation to the KPPCSD Board in January 2013. Kosel said her name was removed along with Koehler's because she "didn't have time to participate.") De Neergaard's name was removed in October 2013 – no

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#### **Writ Defense Costs Reach \$100 per Household**

no reason given.)

A writ of mandate is a court order to a government agency to follow the law by correcting its prior actions, or ceasing illegal acts. (Outlook, March 2013, 'Since We're Neighbors, Let's Be Litigants,' Page 3.)

The action was brought against the Kensington Police Protection and Community Services District Board, and three of the five sitting individual directors – Charles (Chuck) Toombs, Linda Lipscomb, and Richard (Tony) Lloyd, with Chief of Police and General Manager, Gregory Harman, named as a "party of interest."

The petitioners allege that the vote on GM/COP Greg Harman's raise and performance bonus at the July 2012 KPPCSD meeting was taken after the meeting had been extended in a manner incongruent with its Policy and Procedures Manual, and that the vote is therefore null and void. Petitioners also allege that Harman's merit and retention bonus may have been an illegal gift of public funds.<sup>2</sup>

(A comparison of other police chiefs in similar sized towns in the Bay Area suggested that the vote in question brought Harman's pay from among the lowest to an amount equivalent to the mid-range of other Chiefs of Police.)

KPPCSD attorneys, acting on behalf of Lipscomb, Toombs, and Lloyd responded to the complaint by filing an anti-SLAPP motion, asserting that, other allegations contained in the suit aside, the complaint included a suit against public participation (Strategic Lawsuit Against Public Participation), and that the individual directors should therefore be dismissed from the

case – based on their right to vote their consciences on board matters without fear of reprisal.

The trial court denied the anti-SLAPP motion, and KPPCSD appealed that decision. (Anti-SLAPP, and decisions on similar matters, can be appealed after the decision is handed down, before a lawsuit goes any further. Certain interim orders are appealable prior to the disposition of a case – meant to short-circuit cases that may not have merit, rather than allowing them to go through the entire case to judgment. In such cases, the original trial court proceedings are stayed until a decision has been rendered by the Court of Appeal.)

#### **Recent Developments**

On April 1, 2014 a hearing was held before the California Court of Appeal, where oral arguments were presented on the propriety of listing the three named individuals in the writ of mandate, singling out Directors Chuck Toombs, Linda Lipscomb, and Tony Lloyd, and omitting then-Director, Cathie Kosel – one of the original plaintiffs in the suit, and then-Director, Mari Metcalf – the original attorney of record for the plaintiffs (now one of two, along with Timothy Rumberger).

A recent wrinkle in the case found the ACLU filing an amicus brief on behalf of the plaintiffs, though the ACLU did not appear at the April hearing to advocate for its position on the matter.

The Court of Appeal will render a decision on the *appeal* of the *denial* of the anti-SLAPP motion. Typically, the Court would issue a written decision that describes the situation, what principles are at stake, and on what the appeals court decision is based. A decision by the appeals court is expected by June 30th.

The Court can approve or deny the appeal and remand it to the trial court with instructions on how to proceed, or it can make a decision on its own account – a dispositive decision on the appeal, or on the entire case, at the Court of Appeal level.

As the cost to the town of defending the suit has reached the \$200,000 mark (about \$100 per household through March 31st), the Outlook decided to check in with the plaintiffs in the suit and ask them why they feel the issues at stake are worth pursuing at such great expense to the town.

Comments on the writ were invited from all petitioners — original and current. Former petitioner, Cathie Kosel — the only one to respond to the invitation with a response unencumbered by unacceptable demands for editorial control over how the article would be written — had this to say about the writ:

"It is my understanding that the writ was filed to encourage the board to do the people's business in public." Though she did not give any examples, Kosel alleged that, "(t)he board and the GM/COP have gotten into the habit of not following open meeting laws and not providing adequate time, opportunities, and processes to inform the public about how public monies are being spent.<sup>3</sup> There is also a concern that the Board may have made an illegal gift of public funds to Greg Harman in the guise of a retroactive pay raise."<sup>4</sup>

"It seems a shame that the KPPCSD board refused to honor Open Meeting laws and has spent over \$100,000 in legal fees to preserve their (sic) own ability to circumvent the spirit of democracy. The culture surrounding KPPCSD encourages a sort of arrogant, secretive, and careless approach to governance. Why so secretive? Because they are burning through

public money so fast that the smoke from their bonfire leaves democratic principles choking and gasping for air.

"Though their combined revenues are comparable to the Fire Department's, KPPCSD has had to beg for money from WCCUSD to patrol Kensington School,6 beg free rent from the Kensington Fire Department, and collect approximately \$650 in tax measures per year from each household to keep afloat.7

"I support democratic processes which are open and transparent." And guess what? Openness costs less than secretive governance because the exercise of gathering input from many wise heads in our community encourages frugal, efficient, cooperative government. And it does not encourage the divisiveness that currently exists. So I am sympathetic to the petitioners and I admire their commitment to our community. The ACLU apparently agrees.

"All the board had to do was to carry out a proper open meeting process and inform the public in an inclusive way. They arrogantly refused. They chose to spend even more of the people's money by suing the petitioners. Hard for some folks to admit they violated democratic principles. Even an 'Oops! We didn't know. We will table it, bring it back to the next meeting and provide accurate figures before the meeting and even publicize it in the *Outlook*,' would have put this issue to rest. And it would not have cost a dime."

Cathie Kosel was one of the original writ of mandate petitioners – while she was still a sitting Director on the KPPCSD Board. She served one term on the Board, from 2009 to 2012.



# Critical Vote on Doctors Medical Ctr

Measure 'C' Votes Must be Received by May 6th

If you're in an accident and/or hurt, you need immediate medical care. If you have a stroke or heart attack, you need to get to a hospital fast. In West Contra Costa County (which includes Kensington), an ambulance will take you to the Emergency Room at Doctors Medical Center (DMC) in San Pablo (even if you're a Kaiser member).

40,000 patients visit DMC's ER every year. According to Keep Our ER & Hospital Open (KOERHO), if *Measure C* fails, DMC will close, and the treatment hospital for those patients will be further away, and dramatically more crowded. (According to KOERHO, Kaiser's ER only has 15 beds and may have to serve 100 additional patients a day, forcing wait times as long as 10 hours.) Seconds count in an emergency and extra travel time could mean the difference between full recovery, long-term disability, or even death.

DMC is the stroke and heart attack center for all West County. The hospital also provides free breast cancer screening for low-income women and free health screenings for seniors. KOERHO says the hospital has cut costs, reduced overhead, and eliminated management positions. According to its website, "Government reimbursements continue to decline, so while the cost of care is going up, the money DMC receives is going down."

Measure C is a special tax placed on the ballot by the West Contra Costa Healthcare District to prevent the closure of DMC, the only full service emergency room serving all West County residents. If passed, it will enact a 14-cent per square foot tax on property owners within the district that will enable the district to maintain the hospital and emergency room. KOERHO assures voters that all funds raised by the tax would be used only to fund operating and capital costs to keep the hospital and its emergency room open. The funds would also be subject to annual audits by an independent oversight committee.

WCCC residents should have already received their ballots in the mail. To have one's voice counted on this matter, ballots must be received by the County Clerk by May 6th. More information is available at www.KeepOurERopen.com or 284-2461.

Likewise, the community center has seismic and electrical, as well as plumbing problems. We fix it now, or we pay later at a higher cost with much more damage caused by neglect, impacting our slim police budget, and depleting reserves.

#### Yes on Measure L

As Kensington voters decide whether to vote for Measure L for renovation of the Community Center (the "Youth Hut" as many of us call it), there are some important facts to consider.

The Community Center is 50 years old and aging. It was very modestly repaired about thirty years ago, but now needs extensive repairs and safety upgrades.

Essential repairs and seismic upgrades will help ensure that the Community Center can serve as an emergency site for Kensington in the event of an earthquake, fire, or other local disaster.

Throughout the building, electrical and fire safety systems must be updated, as must the bathrooms and Disability Access. A few simple layout modifications are planned that will make the building more functional for simultaneous uses.

If the Community Center is not repaired and maintained, both of which require more money than the KPPCSD building fund affords, then within the next few years the Community Center could become problematic for public use. Doing nothing is really not an option.

The Park Building Committee has been meeting monthly for four years and held several public meetings at which the public was invited to share their opinions and ideas. It makes this recommendation after much due diligence and community support.

Measure L is a good investment in Kensington's future.

We are writing in support of Measure L, the Kensington Community Center safety project. We in Kensington will be asked to vote on several bond measures this spring, and it's all a bit confusing. In May there's a special mail-in ballot election where the West Contra Costa Hospital District is floating the third bond measure within ten years to keep Doctors Medical Center in San Pablo open (Measure C).

Then on June 3rd, there's a primary election with 3 more measures. The West Contra Costa Unified School District is asking us to approve another bond for school repairs and upgrades (Measure H); in addition, the Contra Costa Community College District is seeking more funding to upgrade educational facilities (Measure E)

We will also have our own Kensington Community Center safety project bond on the June ballot (Measure L).

- Measure L funds can only be spent in Kensington for our Community Center;
- Measure L funds cover the full implementation of the project and will not require any additional bond measures;

- Measure L will be funded at a rate of \$14 per \$100,000 of assessed value; this amounts to less than \$5 per month for the average home in Kensington; and
- Measure L requires 67% voter approval so your vote counts!

We urge you to join us in voting YES on Measure L for Kensington.






#### KCC's M.O.? Seeking TLC For the BBQ



<sup>1</sup> A review of the video of the July, 2012 KPPCSD meeting appeared to confirm an extension consistent with the procedure listed in the KPPCSD manual:

**Time Limit for Board Meeting.** All meetings of the Board of Directors must be adjourned by 10pm. Meetings can be extended by a 4/5 vote by the Board, or if less than 4/5 of the Directors are present, a unanimous vote of those Directors that are present. (KPPCSD Policy & Procedures Manual, Sec. 5010.50)

If a meeting is still in session at 9:45pm, the Board President...shall stop the progress of the meeting and suggest which of the remaining items on the agenda will be addressed in the remaining fifteen minutes of the meeting, or ask the Board to consider whether it will extend the meeting as described in Policy #501.50.(KPPCSD Procedures Manual, Sec. 5010.51)

- <sup>2</sup> Regarding the assertion that the one-time merit and retention bonus of \$16,754 was a retroactive pay increase and therefore illegal, my contract had expired on June 30, 2012. According to the terms of that contract, had a new contract *not* been signed, the merit and retention bonus would not have been paid. GM/COP Greg Harman.
- <sup>3</sup> The KPPCSD meeting agenda gets posted to the Public Safety Building, the Cheese Shop kiosk, and the Colusa Market, with a full packet going to the library on the Friday or Saturday prior to each monthly meeting, at the latest well before the Thursday Board meeting, and in full compliance with the Brown Act. The full packet also gets posted to the website at the same time. At 81 citizens' requests, the agenda packet is also e-mailed directly to them.

The District's website maintains past agenda packets, which include financial reports, such as the monthly Profit & Loss Budget Performance, Park Revenue & Expenses, Training & Reimbursement, the General Manager's reports, and the minutes from the previous month's meeting. The website also maintains the audio recordings of the Board meetings, and its current and past budgets and audits, as well as all of the officer's salaries and contracts.

The public is welcomed at every KPPCSD Board, Finance Committee, Policy Committee, Park Building Committee, Park & Recreation Committee, and Solid Waste Coordinating Committee meeting, and is invited to make public comments and ask questions regarding any item of District business or finances. All of these meetings are posted in full compliance with the Brown Act.

The Board of Directors is so supportive of open meetings and transparency, that during the period of time when the Brown Act was suspended, it still posted all of its agendas in full compliance with the Act.

"On July 12, 2012...the Board publicly considered the Chief's compensation. The meeting was lawfully posted and the agenda reflected Board action on compensation. The public was entitled to, and did, hear the discussion about the salary, and commented on

- it...many members of the public were so ready to participate that they read prepared statements."

- <sup>4</sup> The Chief was entitled to annual performance and salary reviews, as per his contract. Due largely to investigations spearheaded by Director Kosel, he was not provided with those reviews for three years. His raise reflects CPI and performance-based increases he could have reasonably expected to have received had those reviews taken place as called for in his contract. (Outlook, Nov. 2012, 'The Election Beat,' FN 4, Page 9. See also original reference: Sept. 2012 Outlook '2012 COP/GM Compensation Analysis,' Page 7.)
- <sup>5</sup> In considering the source of these allegations, it should be noted that Ms. Kosel has a well-documented record of her own regarding the themes she mentions arrogance, secrecy, carelessness, 'openness,' 'transparency,' and "circumventing the spirit of democracy" from her time on the KPPCSD Board of Directors
- "The Outlook has previously documented more than 30 incidents in which...Kosel appears to have misled the citizens of Kensington, to have misrepresented her record, to have violated election laws, and to have accepted potentially illegal campaign contributions. She has been rude to her constituents and fellow board members, lobbied for the police department to adopt illegal hiring policies, spearheaded investigations of the GM/COP and other police officers (all of which were found to be without merit), and more." - <sup>6</sup> As recently reported by the *Outlook*, for the last 20 years, KPPCSD has been picking up the cost of providing the crossing guard, and the Kensington Police Dept. has been providing additional patrols and services for Hilltop Elementary before, during, and after school, including security checks throughout the day and night, and extra traffic enforcement during school commute hours...(WCCUSD)... recently **invited** KPPCSD to apply to receive compensation for those services, going forward. (See Outlook, April 2014, 'Lynn, Keith, and Tony Bring Home the Bacon,' Page 9.)
- <sup>7</sup> As recently reported by the Outlook, the percentage of the property taxes awarded to each district was based on their individual budgets at the time Proposition 13 was passed in 1978; the Police District was reportedly running "lean," while the Fire District was running in the red, and, in the estimation of some, about to go bankrupt. In accordance with the law, the percentages of the 1% property tax were fixed at approximately 30% for the Fire District, to help it survive, and 13% of the 1% for the

#### **12 Questions for the Petitioners**

- 1. This suit is on track to cost the town of Kensington a quarter of a million dollars or more if the entire matter is not settled preemptively by the Court of Appeal. What is it that you're asking for that is important enough to cost the town such a significant sum?
- 2. The suit has been going on for over a year now. What do you think it would it take to settle the case?
- 3. At \$200,000 the cost of the defense to-date, that's about \$100 per household. What would you say to your neighbors about costing each of them this amount of money?
- 4. Whose idea was it to initiate this suit?
- 5. The ACLU filed an amicus brief on the side of the plaintiffs. Can you describe the position it has taken?
- 6. Apparently the ACLU did not appear to argue its position at the April 1st hearing in front of the California Court of Appeal, where oral arguments were presented on the propriety of listing three named individuals in the suit. That seems like a critical hearing for a supporting organization to have missed. Why didn't the ACLU appear?

- 7. It's rumored that the attorneys for the defendants made a settlement offer to avoid further litigation. What was the nature of that offer, and why was it rejected?
- 8. Why were Directors Chuck Toombs, Linda Lipscomb, and Tony Lloyd singled out for suit from the other two sitting KPPCSD Board directors (Cathie Kosel and Mari Metcalf)?
- 9. Do you think that KPPCSD directors should be subject to suit for the opinions they hold and votes they make in the course of their duties for what is essentially a volunteer position?
- 10. Mari Metcalf sued the three respondents on behalf of the petitioners as a private attorney, while simultaneously serving on the District's Board. Doesn't that raise concerns over a potential conflict of interest and a breach of her duties to the District as a director?
- 11. The updated writ contains a request for attorney's fees. What is the amount that the plaintiff's attorneys are claiming, todate? If awarded, how much of that would accrue to Mari Metcalf?
- 12. Some have speculated that this case is now just about bragging rights and about which party is going to pay attorneys' fees. What is your response to that assessment?

Police District. And, as per the statute, it has been that way ever since. The PD makes up the difference with additional assessments, approved by the voters. All taxes and assessments included, the FD (which also collects a small additional assessment in most years) grosses approximately \$2.5M annually, to the PD's \$2.2M – a difference of about \$300,000 annually. The budgets of the two departments appear to show the FD having amassed reserves in the multiple hundreds of thousands of dollars, while the PD continues to struggle financially to fulfill its mandate. (The Outlook, March 2014, 'Should the FD Continue to Charge the PD Rent?' Page 8.)

<sup>8</sup> According to GM/COP, Greg Harman, at the KPPCSD meeting of July 12, 2012, at approx. 9:45pm, Board President, Chuck Toombs called for a motion to extend the meeting past 10pm. The vote was 3 to 2 in favor of extending - not the 4/5 vote required to pass the motion.

After four members of the public spoke, then-Director, Kosel made a motion that was seconded by then-Director Metcalf, to table the discussion on the compensation until the next scheduled board meeting (in August). There was a short break at approx. 9:55pm, and the meeting was reconvened at 10pm.

On the return from the break, Kosel informed the Board that she had a motion and a second on the floor President Toombs informed her that the vote to extend the meeting had not received the required 4/5 vote: she then requested another vote to extend the meeting and all five directors voted to extend the meeting without including a time limit.

Kosel again called for a vote on her motion to table the item. The motion to table the item was rejected by a 3 to 2 vote, and the meeting continued, with members of the public speaking, as well as Directors Kosel and Metcalf participating in the discussions.

At 10:45pm, a motion was made and seconded to offer the GM/COP a contract extension, increase the salary, and make a one time merit and retention bonus of \$16,754, which passed on a 3-2 vote, with Kosel and Metcalf in the minority.

In addition, as to the claim that proper notice was not made under the Brown Act, the California legislature had temporarily suspended the Brown Act during this period. However, the KPPCSD Board continued to follow the rules and provisions of the Brown Act and posted the agenda for the July 12, 2012 meeting well in advance of the 72-hour notice requirement.

The wording of the agenda made it clear what was to be discussed under this item:

"District - New Business...2. KPPCSD Board Vice President Tony Lloyd will present for Board discussion and possible action the salary compensation package for General Manager/ Chief of Police Greg Harman for the July 1, 2012-June 30, 2014 contract period. Board Action."

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TBS also believes that "What matters in education, matters in life." Sometimes what matters most is appreciating the places and people who made us who we are. Join us in doing just that!

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#### **Analysis**

It's interesting to note that, at the July, 2012 meeting at which the vote regarding Harman's raise and bonus was taken, when the directors came back from their break from 9:55-10pm, Director Kosel's motion to table the discussion of the raise until the following meeting was not able to be voted on because, prior to the break, she and Director Metcalf had voted down the motion to extend the meeting.

After the break, when Kosel demanded a vote on her motion to table the vote on the raise. President Toombs reminded her that her motion could not be considered, as no agreement to extend the meeting was in place. She then made a motion to extend the meeting, it was seconded by Metcalf, and the motion was passed unanimously.

Once the meeting was extended, her motion to table the vote on Harman's raise was voted down 3-2. Discussion then continued on the raise and it was eventually passed, again on a 3-2 vote.

Had Director Kosel NOT moved to extend the meeting so a vote could be taken on her motion to table the discussion of the raise, the meeting would have, for lack of an agreement to extend it, adjourned - automatically tabling the vote on the raise.

In light of that scenario, the responsibility for the extension of the meeting and subsequent vote on the raise might reasonably be placed at Director Kosel's doorstep. (Which may explain the hasty removal of her name from the writ, just a month after it was filed. How would it have looked to be suing the District for improper extension of a meeting when one of the plaintiffs in the suit was the Director who had moved to extend it?)



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# **In Memory**

**Richard Lewis Bersin** 

July 4, 1929 - Feb. 11, 2014

Dick Bersin was a kind and beloved husband, father, grandfather, scientist, inventor, and businessman. His sweet caring way, his intellect, and his passion to create and invent will all be forever missed.

Dick was born to Virginia and Maxwell Bersin in New York City. He received a BS

in Physics from MIT in 1950 and an MS in Math and Physics from Northeastern University in 1962.

He enjoyed a career as a physicist and plasma process technologist, and was an inventor at heart. He began his career at Tracerlab in Boston, where he worked from 1950-1968.

In 1969 he founded International Plasma Corporation (IPC) in Richmond, California. IPC pioneered the use of plasma processing for the manufacture of semiconductors.

In 1974, he became Executive Vice President of Dionex Gas Plasma Systems. He

continued his scientific development for Perkin Elmer Corporation in Wilton, Connecticut from 1979-1983.

In 1985, Dick founded Emergent Technology Corporation in New Haven, Connecticut, to focus on environmentally

clean plasma processing,

and later worked in this field for Ulvac Japan, Ltd.

> Dick held more than 12 patents in plasma chemistry, many of which revolutionized the etching of computer chips.

> He was a mentor to young scientists and engineers and inspired his children to be interested in all areas of science.

> He loved to play the piano, was an expert ballroom dancer, and enjoyed music throughout his life.

Dick is survived by his wife, The Rev. Ruth H. Bersin, his sons: Joshua Morris Bersin (Heidi), Adam Samuel Bersin (Ana), and Jacob David Bersin (Emily); by his daughter Rebekah Bersin Funes (Jose Funes); and 9 grandchildren.


