Take Two Seals the Deal

A second meeting was held March 28 by the Kensington Fire Protection District (KFPD) to try to appoint a new director to replace Larry Nagel, who resigned January 31. The first meeting, on March 18, ended in a deadlock, with directors Daniel Levine and Danielle Madugo supporting Rick Artis, and Julie Stein and Jim Watt supporting Thomas Cunniff. The first meeting focused on the need to deal with flammable material inside Tilden Park. Both Artis and Cunniff expressed alarm at the buildup of brush and dead wood on Kensington's border with Wildcat Canyon. Artis discussed the danger of a fire to Kensington Hilltop Elementary, while Cunniff talked about his efforts to clear brush and do plantings to reduce the danger of wildfire. Both believe real action this year must come from discussions with the East Bay Regional Park District.

At the second meeting, it became clear that the two candidates share opinions on other matters as well. Both thought the authorized study by Ridgeline will provide essential information on whether it makes fiscal and governance sense to reorganize Kensington's two special districts into one community services district (a process usually called consolidation). Both charged the past fire district with a failure of governance in the decision to reconstruct the Public Safety Building (PSB) as a fire-only facility.

Said Artis in his closing statement: "The power of this board is to do good things

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Birds, Plants, Lichen, History Anchor the 10th Annual Hillside Fest

This year's El Cerrito Hillside Fest is the tenth iteration of this popular event, held on May 4-5. Put on by the El Cerrito Trail Trekkers and the Environmental Quality Committee, the two days include many opportunities to explore the natural world that surrounds us. The event occurs over several nearby locations so consult www.ectrailtrekkers.org/hillside-festival.html for the schedule and map.

Highlights include an early morning bird walk on Saturday, 8-10am. This 1.5 loop has a couple steep pitches, so bring binoculars and a walking stick if you need one. A history hike follows at 10:30-noon. This one is 2 miles. Kids will enjoy the nature scavenger hunt anytime from 1-3pm (parents can help!). Now that you've rested a bit, take the edible and medicinal plant walk from 3:30-5.

Sunday features another early morning bird walk, an insect hike from 10:30-noon, and two sessions of family-friendly art in the trees, 11-11:45am and noon-12:45 pm. Using paint sticks and watercolors, young artists paint tree trunks and branches in a shady glade. And the ever-popular Haiku hike is from 12:30-2. Listen to winning haikus on a short hike or one a bit longer. The lichen hike, from 4:30-6pm features UC Berkeley's lichen curator Dr. Klara Scharnagl.

These are just a few of the many offerings at this magical annual event. Come partake in the beauty that surrounds us.

What is my view worth? Basic Guidelines For Valuating A View

Peek-A-Boo View (\$10,000-\$30,000) A peek-a-boo view has a sliver or small view from probably only one area of the property. This is usually something that can be overlooked if you're walking through the home auickly.

Partial View (\$30,000-\$60,000) A partial view is usually more than 50% obstructed by other buildings or is a view though in this category.

Premier View (\$60,000-\$150,000) Because there are only so many homes with premier views, this is where the prices really start to climb. Premier views are typically only minimally obstructed (0-20%) and have a wide field of vision.

Panoramic View (\$150,000-\$500,000+) This view is always breathtakina! People will argue that unobstructable, structures. There is no doubt that there panoramic ocean and city lights views will retrieve even more.

Whether you are buying or selling a view home, placing a dollar figure on it can be subjective. I recommend doing a deep analysis of the particulars based on location, category, and condition. But one thing's for certain, once you have one, a view is truly a priceless addition to any home. When buying a view home be sure to memorialize what you have by taking photos and keeping the date of the picture in a file. Should you or future owners need evidence of the view from the property this information is very important to protect it. Hopefully everyone can be reasonable, work together, and agree when a view may compromised in some way.

Racism Demands Immediate Response

On March 26, the administration at Kensington Hilltop Elementary informed community members of "a significant number of incidents in which derogatory slurs have been aimed at students and adults of color on our campus" as well as "many reported micro-aggressions or 'othering' incidents" that "have caused pain and harm [...resulting in] a diminished sense of safety for many of our students and families at Kensington." Moreover, "most of the incidents were observed by many other students, yet no one told an adult." These woeful facts inspire an immediate need for redress.

Racism in our community and especially in our schools is intolerable. Yet here it is, and the fact that it is harming some of our most vulnerable friends, neighbors and their children cannot be ignored. It is the duty of every member of our community to exhibit and promote the values of anti-racism, and it is the responsibility of every parent to instill those values in their children. Kensington's historical legacy as a segregated community in the Berkeley Hills makes these imperatives all the more morally urgent.

It is never too early to talk to your children about race and racism, and there are many resources on how to do so in a thoughtful, sensitive and age-appropriate manner. Neglecting to do so because of the difficulty involved or the delicate nature of the subject is largely the privilege of those who benefit from the sordid effects of racism. Targets of racism are not afforded the privilege of choosing the timing and character of such discussions.

This most recent suite of racist incidents at Kensington Hilltop is the perfect starting point for a discussion with children around the dinner table, or while commuting to an extracurricular. If you do hold and exhibit anti-racist values, teach your children what these values are, why you hold them, and how they can incorporate them into their daily lives. Start with this most basic expectation of decency: do not use racial slurs, even "ironically," and if you are a witness to racist aggression, report it immediately to a trusted adult.

Visioning Meetings Planned for May

Both the Kensington Police Protection and Community Services District (KPPCSD) and the Kensington Fire Protection District (KFPD) will hold visioning sessions in May. The sessions were strongly suggested by consultant Dmitry Semenov, whose company, Ridgeline, is providing a fiscal analysis of whether reorganizing the districts into one entity is advantageous. The districts are splitting the \$49,620 cost of the analysis. Semenov made it clear in a fire board meeting that strategic planning must be a prelude to creating a meaningful study. He wants the boards to come up with options that can be explored and priced out as a combined district or continuing as two separate districts. He urged the boards to be creative and to involve the public in the process. Below are the meeting notices:

The Kensington Police Protection & Community Services District will be holding a special meeting to review and update the draft Strategic Plan that was first presented to the district board in October 2022. The special meeting will be at 1pm on May 9 at the Kensington Community Center. The district is seeking public input on the draft Strategic Plan. for the community. This board has a governance responsibility to Kensington that past boards have shirked.... They created a situation that is untenable for Kensington, knowing there was vociferous opposition. There is work to do to mitigate the harm done to

this community to the tune of millions of dollars. I don't know if the PSB is a done issue..." Calling the decision a horrific gover-

nance event, he said that part of his motivation for joining the board is to give the community a voice in decision-making moving forward. Earlier, Artis stated "there needs to be a governance dialogue in Kensington in a big way. I think it's profoundly important."

Answering a question about how the board should interact with the community, Cunniff said he didn't think "most people have any idea about how fire would take over the building and the police were set adrift.... That [the PSB] should be a fire-only building should have gone to a public vote. The boards have to get the word out about these issues." In response to a question about a five-year plan, he said that part of that plan had to be whether the police should be back in the PSB. "We have to be open to the possibility that the police might cohabit that building.... We need to act in a fiscally responsible manner, for example, the police having nowhere to go. I'd like to see more community involvement in how decisions are made."

Most of the comment from residents who called in on Zoom or attended the meeting supported Artis, who served on 2017's ad hoc committee (lead on the consolidation subcommittee) and also sits on the board of the Kensington Property Owners Association. Given his experience, speakers felt that Artis could hit the ground running. Board comment noted that the two candidates had similar opinions but different styles of engagement. Said board president Levine: "You both had a lot of concerns about wildfire on the ridge. You were both in accord on that issue with possibly different styles. To me that makes the division about style." Cunniff is blunt, pledging to "pick a job and do it," while Artis is more diplomatic and data-driven.

In the end, the board again deadlocked on two separate votes, with the directors voting as they had on March 18. After the second vote, Cunniff said that "given the community support that [Artis] has, people know him and made strong testimony, I withdraw my application." After heartfelt appreciation from the directors, who urged Cunniff to continue engaging in board business, the board voted 4-0 to appoint Rick Artis as the new fire board director. Artis will serve the remainder of Larry Nagel's term, which ends this December. To continue on the board, he would have to win one of the two board seats in the November election. Appointed director Danielle Madugo occupies the other seat (vacated by Don Dommer) and would also have to win election to serve on the board in 2025.

A Garden Grows in Kensington

The Contra Costa Chorale is holding its spring concert on May 11 at Unitarian Universalist Church of Berkeley, 1 Lawson Road, Kensington. This concert, "Make Our Garden Grow," is heartbreakingly special for members of the Chorale, as it will be for audience members as well. Artistic Director Cindy Beitmen was to be celebrated with a world premiere of a piece commissioned by the Chorale board to recognize Cindy's twelve-year tenure with the Chorale. When Cindy took the helm of the group in 2012, it had only about 30 members and had been abandoned by its then director. Now, in 2024, the group has grown to almost 80 people who are fiercely devoted to their community of singers. The commissioned choral work, "Seed," is a beauti-



ful piece by renowned composer Joan Szymko, based on a poem written by Elsa Gidlow, a cofounder of Druid Heights, a bohemian community established in the 1950s in Marin County.

Sadly, however, Cindy Beitmen was admitted to home hospice care in early April, having finally succumbed to the cancer she was diagnosed with seven years ago, suddenly making this concert a much more significant celebration of Beitmen's work with

As a demonstration of that importance, the concert will now be led by one of the world's preeminent choral directors, Dr. Edith Copley, one of Beitmen's dearest friends and a dynamic and exciting conductor who will come from her home in Arizona to work with the Chorale. Additionally, composer Joan Szymko has agreed to conduct the premiere of "Seed" along with another piece of hers that was already scheduled for the



We also welcome this opportunity to make a place in our garden for guest artists with a variety of perspectives, cultures, musical styles, gender expressions, and lived experiences historical and contemporary. Irene Watt passed away on March 2, 2024 at her home of 56 years in Kensington. Irene was born in what became East Germany, then immigrated with her family to West Germany in 1957. After completing her education in chemistry she lived in Paris for three years and then decided to travel around the world. While working for Kaiser in the Bay Area,

she met her husband Jim Watt by accident. Yes, their cars collided in Berkeley, and Jim had the information he needed to start their relationship.

Irene raised two sons, Kensington resident Thomas and Stephen, who teaches English in Massachusetts. Conversant in four languages, Irene led tours of the Bay Area for French, Italian and German tourists. She was an excellent bird watcher, played the recorder and helped families with seniors suffering from dementia. 
PWD are smart, strong, and seaworthy. They were developed to help fishermen herd fish into nets, retrieve tackle, and ferry messages between ships and shore.

Wildcat Firewise Hones in on Hazard **Reduction Strategies**

On March 13, Wildcat Firewise hosted an educational walk with El Cerrito-Kensington Fire Department's Captain Traviss Crumpacker, focusing on hazard reduction. The walk, attended by about 20 community members along Kensington Road, focused on how hazards around the home can be addressed by residents to lower wildfire risk.

Captain Crumpacker, along with Tom Peters, the department's new fire prevention officer, highlighted the dangers of Diablo winds and the potential of fastmoving wildfires in our area. They underscored the importance of removing certain types of vegetation, like junipers, eucalyptus, and bamboo, due to their high flammability and tendency to obstruct escape routes during fires.

Residents were advised to eliminate all non-essential flammable materials from their properties, including foliage and wooden structures connected to homes. The walk also emphasized the often-overlooked flammable components of houses, such as screen doors and roofing materials. Simple changes, like

installing metal screen doors and applying fire-resistant caulk to seal gaps, can significantly increase a home's defense against wildfires.

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

Kensington Eats Sustainable Seafood By Ittai Shiu

Every Friday afternoon neighbors drop by Angela Chan's house for their routine visit. Situated at the intersection of Rugby and Yale, a sizable cooler filled with ice sits in front of her house where each visitor sorts through individually wrapped bags for the one bearing their name filled with a curated selection of freshly caught seafood. Depending on the day's catch, these bags contain anything from mussels to oysters to various types of local fish.

Angela and her husband Sam relocated to Kensington in 2022, just before the birth of their son, Avery. With a longstanding appreciation for fresh, sustainable seafood, the family was introduced to this community seafood program in 2020 when the pandemic impacted the food industry and limited choices for food lovers. However, upon settling into their new community, Angela noticed the absence of similar options in Kensington and decided to take the initiative!

Enter Seaforager, a community-supported fishery (CSF) program with pick-up locations all over the Bay Area. Their mission

centers on preserving healthy fisheries for future generations by supporting fishermen who fish responsibly, providing fair compensation, and upholding transparency in the supply chain that allows consumers to trace each fish back to its origin. Never dragged, Sea Forager has higher sustainability standards than Monterey Seafood Watch, plus sustainable packaging.

The Sea Forager program allows customers to select from various neighborhood pickup spots across the Bay Area and customize the size, type, and frequency of their orders. They can choose between the Neptune's Delight which can include fish or shellfish, and the Slab, which is strictly fish fillets (no shellfish.)

"We found that there were no pick-up sites in Kensington, so we began hosting them weekly on Fridays at our house," says Angela. "it's been a great opportunity to connect with neighbors and share our connection with the sea while supporting a local business."





Angela's favorite deliveries have included local rockfish, salmon, and McFarland Springs rainbow trout and as part of the subscription, members learn about the seasons of seafood, and get the story behind the fish along with prep tips and easy recipes. On the website www. seaforager.com visitors can subscribe to a package, manage their deliveries, and also sign up for their coastal fishing and foraging classes.

Kirk & Camilla, the duo behind Sea Forager say, "We are lucky to live in a place with incredible bounty, community, and wonderful hosts like Angela. And while it feels good to do good, it also tastes better. Small boat hook and line fishermen take better care of their fish, and the result is a higher quality product that our Bay Area home cooks can really have fun with. Supporting healthy fisheries and the people who go the extra mile to catch and harvest them responsibly is tasty work!"

Thanks to the efforts of Sea Forager and Angela, our community has access to convenient, freshly caught, sustainable seafood to create satisfying meals without having to leave Kensington.

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
