Voters weigh \$400 million school construction bonds

The West County Unified School District will ask voters to approve up to \$400 million in bonds to fund renovations and reconstruction of schools throughout the district.

Measure J on the November 8 ballot calls for funding projects for 17 schools throughout the district including four high schools. The funds would be used to repair leaking roofs, decaying walls and deteriorating bathrooms. It will also be used to construct new classrooms to reduce overcrowding and replace portable classrooms with permanent ones.

The use of the bond funds will be restricted to the improvement of school facilities and will be monitored by a citizens' oversight committee. The board of education will also be required to conduct an annual independent performance audit to ensure funds are spent only on projects listed in the measure. If passed, the school district will become eligible for \$40 million in additional state matching funds. Property owners would be required to pay \$31.10 per \$100,000 of assessed value during the first year of debt service. That amount would increase up to \$60 per \$100,000 of assessed value as the full amount of bonds are sold.

The average cost to property owners during the 30 year life of the bonds is expected to be \$55.50 per \$100,000 of assessed value.

The bond measure follows two earlier construction measures from the school district in recent years. In 2000, voters approved Measure M, a \$150 million sale of bonds to repair and upgrade elementary schools in the district.

In 2002, voters approved measure D, a \$300 million bond measure used to perform

additional construction, which included the \$17 million renovation and expansion of Kensington Hilltop Elementary School completed earlier this year.

Unlike Measure B, the \$8 million parcel tax approved last year to fund the school district, bond measures by law cannot contain a provision for a senior exemption.

Supporters say with continued budget problems in Sacramento Measure J is "well-balanced and sorely needed."

Opponents, though, argue the district's facilities plans have grown to \$1.3 billion from \$500 million and said voters cannot afford the district's "irresponsible and spendthrift schemes.

97-year-old woman loses control of car on Arlington Ave.

No one injured in accident involving five cars and property damage

A 97-year-old Kensington woman lost control of her car on Arlington Ave. leaving a trail of damaged cars before crashing through a residential fence and coming to a rest 22 feet up a dirt embankment.

No one was hurt in the incident, which happened September 29 around 4 p.m., but the driver was transported by ambulance to Alta Bates Hospital for evaluation.

The accident began when the woman driving a Ford Thunderbird skidded through a stop sign at Arlmont and struck a green Subaru that was travelling south on Arlington Ave. The impact spun the Subaru 180 degrees.

The Ford continued on Arlington and struck two parked cars outside of the Arlington Community Church, launching both of them off the street and into the bushes of the church.

As the woman continued down Arlington Ave. she hit a fourth car parked beyond south of Rincon Road.

The woman told police she could not understand why the car would not stop and she decided to exit the roadway by crossing a lane of oncoming traffic and driving up a dirt embankment to stop the car. In the process, the front end of her car crashed through a fence at 79 Arlington Ave.

Police said they inspected the woman's vehicle and found no mechanical problems that would have caused the accident.

They concluded that she stepped on the accelerator when she thought she was stepping on the brake and continued to accelerate along Arlington causing her to travel at a high rate of speed when she lost control of the car.

Police have forwarded a copy of its incident report to the Department of Motor Vehicles and have recommended that the department require that she submits to a new driving test. Police issued no citations as a result of the accident.







Library group kicks off survey as first step to win state construction funds

The Kensington Library Renewal Project, a community group established to consider alternatives for reconstruction or replacement of the Kensington Library, has launched a community-wide survey.

The survey represents part of an effort by the group to grab a portion of \$600 million in state library construction bond funds that could become available if a June ballot measure is successful.

Though Kensington has the highest per capita use of its library of any in the Contra Costa library system the building, a 40year-old structure built to house a collection half its current size of 40,000 items.

The current 5,000 square-foot building suffers from outdated electrical and telecommunications, a heating system that's grown unreliable and bathrooms that do not conform with the requirements of
