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

KPPCSD Board Election

Election season is exciting because we have the opportunity to identify and vet issues in our community. This year we are fortunate to have 7 intelligent candidates for the 3 open KPPCSD director positions. I hope the candidates will discuss: 1) fair total compensation packages for our police force, 2) hiring a part time general manager, and 3) the general approach of bullying critics of the chief into silence.

Our budget is \$2.3 million for police services, or \$256,000 per officer. Comparable cities budget in the range of \$201,000 per officer. The combined general manager/chief of police position is extremely unusual because it is fraught with danger. Police chiefs in America have awesome power to protect or abuse our Constitutional rights, and they require supervision by an alert manager and an active board of directors. Kensington's GM/COP constructs the budget that he spends, which is a clear conflict of interest. Complaints about police conduct is (sic) reviewed by the Chief of Police, not an objective General Manager. The GM position could be funded by eliminating the second administrative assistant position. I believe there have been a number of ethical lapses on the part of the current GM/COP including harassment and intimidation of employees, directors, and citizens of Kensington.

I believe that Mari Metcalf, Tony Lloyd, and Eyleen Nadolny have the courage to address these issues and they have my vote.

Over the past 7 months, the Kensington Farmers' Market has been a rare success story in the midst of businesses downsizing or closing, real estate prices softening, and public services being curtailed. Following an extended period of anemic performance, the Market has experienced a turnaround since Chris Hall was appointed Manager in March 2010 - moving from limited vendors and a lack of competition to a tripling of available produce, addition of new and sought-after goods, and multiple small organic farms becoming sustainable. To hear of the Board's dismissal of Chris Hall based on rumors lacking in any known substance, or due process, has created a ground-swell of disappointment and outrage. It is our hope that the injustice to him and to the community will be immediately remedied by an open and fair review and reinstatement.

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New Management at Farmers' Market

There has been a change in the management of the Kensington Farmer's Market. Here is the story, as told by the outgoing manager, Chris Hall. – Ed.

In early September, having just learned that this non-profit association was without bylaws, and also had other issues of legitimacy, one of the four active board members of the Kensington Farmers' Market resigned.

The resigning board member was also not in agreement with the other two members (who are vendors at our market), about their position of not wanting to allow new vendors into the market who sell goods which are competitive with their own products. (This, despite the fact that they are happy to have a free-market economy for the rest of the vendors.)

On the eve of the board meeting scheduled for Friday Sept. 10th, I met with the board (of which I had been a member since 2008), seeking to resolve my concerns about these, and other issues.

At this conference, having become the sole dissenting vote on our (then three-person) board, my personal concerns regarding the liabilities of this non-profit, the imbalance and slant of the board, and its dissatisfaction with a free-market philosophy on running the market, it was clear to me that this couldn't be a productive relationship.

I resigned from the board and offered to continue as the market manager, but was told by the then two remaining members of the board that, as of that Sunday, they would also be taking over management of the market - an abrupt, chaotic, and distressing transition for many vendors.

I was asked to join the Kensington Farmers' Market Association board in 2008, and have worked on issues relating to our market, pro bono, until my termination.

Last February I was asked to undertake a search for a market manager, but the market was down to as few as four vendors and none of the active farmers' market associations were interested in taking it on. I volunteered to recruit more vendors, and then again look for an association to manage our market.

As we moved into spring, my recruiting efforts began to pay off, and soon the number of market vendors was up to 10. By June we were up to 14, at which point the board strongly stated that I needed to keep doing what I was doing and asked me to stay on in the post of Market Manager.

As we moved into summer, the market participation increased again to 24, and we then had a very viable market, to which our community came out in full support every Sunday. By the end of August, Oak View Avenue was completely full with food, produce, and hand crafts, and was

Berkeley Opera Finishes Boffo Season • New Name for 2010-11

When Berkeley's opera company moved into its new home in the state-of-the-art Community Theater on the El Cerrito High campus last year, it came with a new Artistic Director, Kensington resident (and native) Mark Streshinsky. Now

it is getting a new name to reflect the change of venue and a wider audience: Berkeley West Edge Opera.

In fact, Kensington has historic ties to Berkeley Opera; its very first production, in 1980, was in the Unitarian Church. Eventually the company settled into the Julia Morgan Theater, which seats 300; El Çerrito's new theater holds 600. As a measure of the season's success, Streshinsky says, "Attendance has almost doubled, and sales of season tickets


have tripled. The response to this first season in our new home has been unbelievable. The final performances of Wagner's Legend of the Ring sold out."

With the help of his wife, soprano Marie Plette, a veteran of the country's major opera houses, Streshinsky was able to convince other starry principals to sing major roles. In The Ring alone: Richard Paul Fink, a leading baritone at New York's Metropolitan Opera - and well known to San Francisco Opera fans - appeared as Wotan; Jay Hunter Morris, a regular at Los Angeles and Houston Operas, sang Siegfried. El Cerrito Democratic Club Endorses

El Cerrito Democratic Club Endorses Linda Lipscomb for KPPCSD Board Seat

In keeping with its strong tradition of reviewing candidates for local offices, the El Cerrito Democratic Club met on August 31st to hear from the seven candidates running for the three open seats on the Kensington Community Services Dis*trict* board.

By the end of an evening of pointed questions and thoughtful answers the members of the club had endorsed Linda Lipscomb, formerly president of the Kensington Improvement Club and one of the principal members of the Kensington's Measure G successful campaign team.

The other six candidates include Ms. Lipscomb's two colleagues on the Kensington-First slate: Paul Dorroh and Tony Lloyd; as well as the four candidates running individually: Eyleen Nadolny, Kim Manning Zvik, Nicki Boye Kaiser and Mari Elaine Metcalf. All were present except Tony Lloyd; Ms. Lipscomb delivered a brief message from him. The club can only endorse registered Democrats; although Mr. Dorroh and Ms. Kaiser are not eligible for the Club's endorsement, they accepted the club's invitation to participate, which provided the audience with information on all the candidates.

Despite its name, the El Cerrito Democratic Club covers an area that reaches beyond the city's borders to include Kensington and surrounding communities. As the only chartered Democratic club in the area it continues to include members from - and meet with candidates for - Kensing-

Tuesday night presented an opportunity for all members, regardless of city of residence, to hear about some of the unique issues facing Kensington.

One of the major items of discussion was focused on the recently passed Measure G, which shored up the funding imbalance between the existing level of property tax and the portion of Kensington's budget primarily related to funding its independent Police Department. The candidates had widely divergent opinions about Measure G. Ms. Lipscomb and Mr. Dorroh spearheaded the campaign. Ms. Kaiser and Ms. Vick were proponents of Measure G. Ms. Nadolny stated some concerns about Measure G but was ultimately in favor, and Ms. Metcalf opposed the measure.

The candidates addressed a number of questions with regard to Kensington Police Department personnel actions as well as the performance of the General Manager/ Chief of Police. There was general consensus from the candidates in support of the actions of the Chief, and, except for Ms. Metcalf and Ms. Nadolny, the candidates agreed with the Kensington Board's recent decision to extend his contract.

Another point of discussion was the upcoming construction of a bathroom facility in the Kensington Park. Several candidates, including Ms. Lipscomb, Mr. Dorroh and Ms. Vick, supported the existing development program. Ms. Kaiser, Ms. Nadolny, and Ms. Metcalf were concerned about construction costs and proximity to neighbors on Windsor Avenue. As a note to readers, the cost of the bathroom is being funded by the East Bay Regional Park District bond measure.

The Kensington Community Service District has a five-member board. Each of the directors serves for four years. The three seats open in the current election are being vacated by Bill Wright, Pat McLaughlin and John Stein. (Mr. Stein was appointed by the board to fill the seat vacated in midterm by Cindy Kimball.) The election will be held on November 2.

She loved folk and world music, Tilden Park, the ocean, all the arts, dancing, excellent food and wine, playing cards and games, drumming, and lively conversation

Vivian inspired all who knew her with her strong, artistic spirit and her enthusiastic enjoyment of every moment of her life. Her greatest joy was empowering women to live to their potential.

Blair Morton Boyd, Jr. Nov. 24, 1926- Sept. 1, 2010

Bibliophile, publisher, geographer, and traveler, with a keen intellect and unquenchable curiosity about people, their life stories, and places he loved. Blair's interests ranged from Pueblo culture, trains, music, and Scottish history, to baseball. He brought compassion, high spirits, and joy in learning to

Against the backdrop of a small Midwestern town, he found inspiration in his aunt Helen Boyd's liberal beliefs and adventurous spirit that drew her to Greenwich Village in the '20's and '30's. Blair was always a passionate voice for peace, tolerance, and social justice.

Born in Redlands, CA, the younger son of Blair Morton Boyd Sr. and Mary Elizabeth Post, Blair grew up in Hillsboro, Ohio, and attended the Arizona School for Boys in Tucson, AZ and the Asheville School in Asheville, NC. Following his freshman year at Harvard, he served in the US Navv in 1945-6 as a radar operator on an aircraft carrier that was steaming toward the Pacific when the war ended.

After graduating from Harvard in 1949 (Class of '48) with a BA cum laude in history, Blair joined the Brattle Theatre in Cambridge, MA, as box office manager. A veterans' repertory company known for performing classics from Shakespeare to Shaw, the Brattle had a policy of hiring actors, such as Zero Mostel, blacklisted by the US government during the 1950's.

During the 50's and early 60's, he studied anthropology at the University of New Mexico and worked as an editor at the UNM Press, where he helped

produce the literary magazine, New Mexico Quarterly. Blair reveled in the artistic and cultural vibrancy of New Mexico, serving as managing director of the Albuquerque Modern Museum, and opening the "A" Pool, Albuquerque's first nonsegregated swimming pool.

Moving with his family to Berkeley, CA in the early '60's to attend graduate school in geography at the University of California, Blair became editor of Landscape, a prestigious journal of cultural geography and a touchstone in his intellectual and social life. He founded Sumiko Inc., an import company specializing in high-end stereo equipment for audiophiles.

Active in the peace and civil rights movements during his Berkeley years, Blair produced the documentaries, People's Park, Word is Out and Holy Ghost People.

Blair's travels took him to Micronesia, Antarctica, Cayman Islands, the Yukon, Iceland and Greece, and Scotland, whose landscapes, music, and culture he cherished.

Blair is survived by his wife, Kirsten Falke-Boyd, his children, Megan Chaskey and Brian Boyd, stepdaughters, Kathe Boyd, Erica Boyd and Sara Costello; ten grandchildren and two great grand-

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


Facebook Photo Inspires Alumni Fundraising Efforts for El Cerrito High School Music Program

THE INTERVIEW: New Kensington Police Officer, Kevin Hui

The first thing you notice about Officer Hui ("Call me Kevin"), is his friendly, informal, approachable manner. Dig a little deeper and you discover his droll sense of humor and his commitment to making the world a better place.

He's obviously been welcomed by the other officers on the force, as evidenced by comments by Detective Keith Barrow and Officer Manny Ramos, neither of whom neglected to laud Kevin as they passed

through the room in which Kevin was in the process of being interviewed. "He's an excellent officer," Barrow said as he passed by.

Already lauded for his work ethic after having been on the force full time only since April, "He's very proactive in addressing traffic issues," opined Officer Ramos. Pulling people over – for citations or warnings – and

identifying problem areas such as speeding or not stopping for stop signs, Officer Hui has already been singled out by Chief Greg Harman for improving the coverage of the department as it pertains to traffic safety.

Kevin began his association with the Kensington Police Department as a reserve officer (working for free), back in November. (He worked almost six months without pay.) "It was an opportunity to get my foot in the door, and hopefully obtain a full time job – which I did," he smiled.

"Due to cutbacks, I was laid off from Burlingame PD after 17 months (in that assignment), and it took me ten months to get in over here as a reserve officer, Kevin informed us. (It's a 2- to 8-month process of background checks and interviews, etc. to even qualify for a position.)

"Growing up, a career in law enforcement or the military was never an option for me — my parents wanted me to be a doctor; typical Chinese parents. It wasn't until I started shooting competitively and becoming friends with others in the sport, that my new acquaintances asked me if I'd ever considered a career in law enforcement. They thought I'd be good at it, due to my work ethic and my personality. I thought about it for three years because I didn't want to disappoint my parents. I decided to do it because I thought it was a way for me

to make the world a little bit better place. I saw the positive impact my father, as a dentist who did a lot of pro bono work in the Asian community, had on other people's lives – things that didn't really benefit him at all. Police work is a way for me to make a living, using my skill set, and it gives me the chance to do something to help other people.

"One of the things that surprised me about police work is that oftentimes depart-

ments are poorly equipped address problems as they should be addressed. Interestingly, in higher volume departments such as Burlingame, you don't always have the time or the resources to spend to take care of a given situation. One of the things I value about coming to Kensington, that the pace is a little slower so we have the time and



resources to address problems that arise, properly. Strangely enough, I think I actually end up working a little bit harder here


than I did in Burlingame.

"I love to show up for work every day. I think that's a rarity. I enjoy going to work. It's not just one specific thing. I like the variety, each day is different; you never know what you're going to get; you don't have a set task list; I like the fact that I never know who I'm going to meet on a given day. Part of me doing a good job is getting to know the residents and the people who pass through town. I meet a lot of people I knew when I grew up here. (Kevin lived here for first 18 years of his life, including a stint at *Windrush School*.)

"The most challenging part of my job is never having enough time to complete all the tasks I want to do. There's always a big list of things I want to get done, and not enough hours in the day."

Kevin is married, and, when asked if he had any children, he said he and his wife didn't have any kids "yet." (Talk about having a list of things you want to get done!)

a safe, enjoyable, gathering place for all. There was a healthy wait list of vendors wishing to get into our market, and I had built up a strong presence of several different musicians and entertainers.

By the time I was dismissed as the manager of our market, I was proud to have played a role in creating a farmers' market worthy of Kensington.

Although I have worked on a number of community and school committees in my 23 years here in Kensington, my work rebuilding the farmers' market has far eclipsed any of those opportunities in the pleasure and satisfaction it has given me. Thanks, Kensington!

KFMA Board Member Alexandra Eisler Responds

When we asked current market director, Alexandra Eisler, if the KFMA is without bylaws, she replied that the non-profit group, incorporated in May of 2008, with a board made up of four market vendors and one community member, does have bylaws, passed on September 10th, 2010. Its current board includes Eisler (of Kensington Marmalade Co.), Andrea Salazar of Lone Oak Farm, "two additional current market vendors" (unnamed), "and a third farmer/vendor who must confirm his schedule before committing his time."

Eisler said that it is not true that she and Salazar refuse to allow vendors in competition with their businesses a presence at the market. "The Kensington Farmers' Market is a certified farmers' market," she said, "which means we look to the California Federation of Certified Farmers' Markets, our governing body, for guidance about standard operating procedures. When the KFMA was formed 2008, all board members, including Chris Hall, wrote and approved a market application for new vendors that follows these practices, including board review of vendor applications in order to limit duplication in the market. At the moment we do have duplication, particularly in the agricultural side of the market."

When asked why Chris Hall was terminated as Market Manager, Alexandra replied, "I am sorry, but Andrea and I aren't able to discuss personnel issues with you."

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
