Cranky in Kensington

Dear Editor,

Here's my opinion on why people remain cranky in Kensington, despite the Board now consisting of five members who all vote alike: The influential 'board supporters' hold grudges and don't understand contracts. They expressed outrage over paying for Bay View's mailing to residents in 2010 the explanation for why our rates needed to go up, apparently without realizing that that money came out of Bay's View's franchise fee, not from our taxes, and that the mailing was normal.

Those are the same 'community leaders' who selected an either like-minded police chief for us, or one who knows on which side his bread is buttered. They can't seem to understand that not all of us are thrilled with his performance, so they're angry with those of us who'd prefer a police chief who is good at bridging differences and calming waters over one who won't admit his own mistakes and who attracts

And the KCC went outside Kensington to hire an Outlook editor who fans flames. (A previous BCC president defended him as 'stimulating.')

This past election was waged on the charged shortcomings of the losing candidates, not on the competence of the winners. Reelecting Toombs and electing Gillette was supposed to solve all our problems, all caused, we were told, by 'troublemakers.' It now seems we have five incompetent Board members, and to prove it our taxes have been 'voted up' as high as they can go without a new referendum. Our Board's expensive and unnecessary defense-against-the-writ is a drop in the bucket compared to the overall lawyer bills and redundant and/or unnecessary 'studies' our Board has authorized (with more to come).

In the next election three of them will be up for reelection. I hope that there are three civic-minded residents, not part of our grudge-holding 'ruling elite,' and not yet sullied by the Outlook, who will run on transparency and competence and actually end the dysfunction.

Contributions, Legal Fees

It is widely accepted that groups make contributions to political campaigns for legislative gain. Yes, the police officers have a right to contribute to campaigns, but that does not mean it is appropriate for the candidates to accept them, particularly when they are serving on the contract negotiating committee. If people are outraged that Cathie Kosel used Bay View's mailing list, why aren't they equally outraged that other candidates accepted a large contribution from a group whose contract was up for renewal?

I resent the accusation that my fellow petitioners & I are MAKING the KPPSCD spend large amounts of money on legal bills. Is Bay View being blamed for making the district spend over \$175,000 on that matter? The KPPSCD board themselves decided to vigorously fight the petition rather than find other settlement options. When I saw the lengthy response prepared by the board attorneys, my first reaction was 'How many billable hours did this cost?' The board decided to file an anti-SLAPP motion against the petitioners in an attempt to bully and intimidate us into withdrawing the petition. This motion was denied by the judge in the case, and now the board has decided to spend district money to appeal. The board would rather squander district money on legal fees than to admit that they did not follow their own procedures. I am quite sure that Hanson-Bridgett law firm is quite happy to keep those billable hours going.

The board wants to argue that they are not obliged to follow its Policy and Procedures Manual, claiming that it is only advisory. It is pretty outrageous that they claim that they only need follow rules when they want to. It is especially outrageous that it is the directors of our local district who are making that claim.





Charter School Application Denied

According to a local resident, the West Contra Costa Unified School District (WCCUSD) Board voted on August 12th to deny the application of Silicon Valleybased Summit Public Schools to operate a grade 7-12 charter school for 677 students at the former Windrush site (recently purchased by the Pleasanton-based Chamberlin Family Foundation) in El Cerrito. Charter schools are privately managed by a charter company and its board of directors. They are publicly funded and receive per-pupil dollars from the school district.

Summit's stated mission is "to prepare a heterogeneous student population for success in college and to be thoughtful, contributing members of society." Its aim is to admit 120 students per grade, starting in fall 2014. The Summit recruitment plan lists 23 elementary schools zoned from Hilltop Mall to Point Isabel, and from Point Richmond to Kensington. Summit employees, charter association representatives, and teachers trained by Summit spoke in favor of the proposal.

Two Richmond parents told the board they would like to drive their kids to El Cerrito for school.

Several Kensington and El Cerrito parents spoke against the location, saying its proximity to Portola Middle School and El Cerrito High would "skim off the top," leaving only the most needy and disadvantaged students in those two schools. One Kensington resident pointed out that the school's application was not available in Spanish. Another said the language in the petition "is sufficiently vague to justify vastly different diversity targets." Board member, Charles Ramsey said, "The whisper campaign in the hills is raging."

In making its vote, the Board said Summit would be unlikely to achieve the heterogeneity targets stated in the application.

Summit can now bring the same petition before the Contra Costa County Board of Education, which can authorize the charter to operate at the former Windrush site - essentially overruling the WCCUSD Board.

Olive (Ollie) Shaner Kensington Resident Aug. 10, 1924 - July 30, 2013

Ollie Shaner passed away peacefully from cancer on Tuesday, July 30th. Ollie touched many lives and will be dearly missed.

Born to Blanche and Kenneth Premo in Porterville, CA, Ollie grew up there and graduated from Porterville High School in 1942. She then attended UC Berkeley, where she was a Representative at Large in the campus government. She was a life-long member of Alpha Gamma Delta sorority. She received her B.S. in Public Relations and Accounting in 1946. In May 1946 she married her high school sweetheart, Bob Shaner, and then worked for the university while Bob completed his education at Cal. In 1948 the two of them moved to Kensington after purchasing a lot from Bernard Maybeck. Since they had to promise to construct the house themselves, they started out small. While Bob built, they reared three children. Ollie was an active member of PTA and other organizations. Later, she returned to Cal as a Principal Accountant.

Ollie was a lifelong Cal Bears fan and knew the statistics of all the football and basketball players. She was president of her T.W.I.G. investment club and played bridge with several groups. Ollie and a group of friends were charter members of the former "Kingdom of Kensington" and the "Jewel Lake Yacht Club." Her motto was to greet life with humor and always be optimistic about the future. She loved people, and many fortunate guests passed through the Shaner household doors.

These three topics were discussed:

1. In what community priority should the library play a more active role?

Top Responses: More after school programming for kids, 'tweens, and teens; Making the library ADA compliant, and creating enjoyable community space in the library that allows for meetings, learning, and technology; Creating community programs and outreach to new and current residents - the "Welcome Wagon" model; Creating space to provide technical and electronic support.

2. What one thing could the library do better?

Top Responses: More hours: open seven days a week, eight hours per day - or change the hours so that El Cerrito and Kensington libraries are not both closed on Wednesdays; Dedicated staff to work with technology questions: technology librarian, technical support; Improve accessibility of the library; "Upgrade the facility."

3. What is the single most important contribution the library makes to our community today?

Top Responses: Keeping literacy at the forefront, especially for kids; Serving as a depository for expensive and hard-to-find information, including access to the Internet; Providing materials in all formats to all segments of the population; Serving as a community resource; Providing free access to educational and entertainment materials; Providing unrestricted access to quality information and books.

According to Laura Martinengo, Community Library Manager, the town hall meeting was one of a series of such meetings in libraries, county-wide. Once the data from the town meetings and other such surveys are analyzed, a strategic plan is expected to be drafted, after which a period for further input by library users is expected.




