Perhaps you've noticed that the area surrounding the Community Center has gone from a jungle to a garden. Maybe you've seen volunteers wielding secateurs and saws. Perhaps you'd like to join them. Just don't call it gardening.

"I prefer to think of myself as a restorationist and a fuels manager," says Charli Danielsen, who lives within walking distance of the Community Center. In fact, Danielsen is better known as a native plant guru—she started her nursery Native Here in Tilden Park a couple decades ago, and

the proposed large shopping center to be built at the top of the hill in the early 1950s. We sounded the alarm, and with the help of concerned citizens, we were able to sidetrack the proposal. Had it gone through, it would have changed Kensington dramatically."

was president of the California Native Plant Society. "In 2013," she explains, "Dan O'Brien started making noise in the Outlook about how we'd let the pines in the park go, that we had not been properly tending to vKensington's park area."

O'Brien grew up in Kensington, and his father had planted some of those pines that had gotten out of hand. O'Brien had his own expertise to bring to the table: he worked for the National Park Service as a see Landscapes, Page 6

Everyone Loves Pie!

Infertility Study Seeks Subjects Dear Editor,

I am seeking volunteers to participate in a study that aims to explore the experiences of older age women who identify as infertile and involuntarily childless. The project offers participants the opportunity to share their stories and to contribute to a better understanding of the long-term impact of infertility and childlessness, with a goal of eventually helping health-care providers better meet the needs of their patients.

I am a clinical psychology doctoral student attending Berkeley's Wright Institute (and also a Kensington resident!). Should any Outlook readers fit the study criteria and wish to contribute to a better understanding of infertility and childlessness, I would be grateful. Participants will take part in an audio-recorded interview with me (about 90 minutes), consisting of a series of questions about the subject's

thoughts, feelings, and experiences related to her infertility and childlessness. The interview will be confidential and identifying information will be removed from study documentation and will not appear in the final results. Those eligible for this study are women age 60 and older who identify as infertile and as involuntarily childless, and who have not had biological, adopted, step-, or foster children. 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

Neighborhood Notes

Willie C. Archie: Devoted Husband and Father

William Calvin Archie was born November 9, 1942 in Bastrop, Louisiana. The family moved to Oakland in January, 1943 and joined the Beth Eden Baptist Church, which would prove a constant in Willie's life. His involvement in Sunday school, Boy Scouts, Baptist Youth Fellowship, and the Youth Choir shaped his later years. He served as a member of the Board of Trustees for over 40 years and as a Deacon for 18 years.

Willie received a BA in business administration from San Francisco State and an MBA from Golden Gate University. He was the first African American management trainee for International Harvester but was drafted the same year. Willie learned German during his Army stint and excelled at marksmanship. In 1967, while attending an Ecumenical Conference at Asilomar, Willie met the love of his life, Angela Maria Alexander. They were

married August 25, 1968 and raised two beautiful children, Raymond Calvin Archie and Renata Maria Archie.

Willie went on to become an honored employee of the University of California, Office of the President, and worked at UC systemwide for 40 years. He was also a member of the Faculty Club for 38 years. In addition to chorus and religious affiliations, Willie found time to establish his own business, Archie's Tax Service, where he served clients for more than 40 years.



Willie's wife, son, and daughter reflect on a

man who was not only a dedicated husband but the most awesome father. He was never satisfied to hear your problems, instead challenging you to present him with several well thought-out solutions. He never stopped nurturing his wife, children, grandson, godchildren, and the community. He was a most genuine and loyal family man and friend. The Archies have lived in Kensington for over 40 years. Willie died on July 9.

William Buehring: World Traveler and Musician

William Richard Buehring, a resident of Kensington for 48 years, died January 18, 2015 at the age of 76 from prostate cancer. He was born in 1938 in Chicago, the son of German immigrants, Wilhelm Bühring and Gertrude Kozikowski. He received his BA degree from Valparaiso University in civil engineering, MA in construction engineering from Stanford, and PhD in ocean engineering from UC Berkeley. He served two years in Vicksburg, MS at the US Army Corps of Engineers Waterways Experiment Station before resuming employment with Healy Tibbitts Con-



struction Company in San Francisco. He designed outfall sewer pipelines, offshore oil-drilling platforms, breakwaters, dams, bridge pillars, and other underwater structures, work that frequently took him to many parts of the world including Hawaii, Alaska, Trinidad, Mexico, Peru, Ecuador, the North Sea, Greece, China, Philippines, and Australia. In 1978 he started his own consulting business in Kensington, working mainly on California projects until his retirement in 2010. A local example of his early work is the design of the underwater concrete foundation and stilts supporting Skates Restaurant on the Berkeley Marina.

Throughout his adult life he played the banjo and was deeply bonded with the folk music community in the East Bay, many of whom referred to him affectionately as "Banjo Bill." With his fellow musicians, he frequently played at the Crop Swap in North Berkeley and the annual Berkeley Street Fair. He loved camping and hiking, and eagerly took on remodeling and handyman challenges. Bill was a devoted family man and is survived by his wife Gertrude (Trudy), sisters Joann Brehm and Barbara Magill, daughters Anna and Jessica, son-in-law Kanus Ulrichs, and eight grandchildren.

Preparing for the Big One

On August 29, more than 50 Kensington Area 3 residents participated in a drill organized by citizen volunteers of the Kensington and El Cerrito Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) with the cooperation of the Kensington/El Cerrito Fire Department. At 10 am, car horns honked, indicating a major earthquake in the Westminster Avenue area. Residents practiced duck-and-cover in their homes, tended to their family's immediate needs, and then walked to the Area 3 disaster meeting spot in the backyard of Terry Morioka's home at Westminster and Kenyon avenues. Donuts, coffee, and homemade scones were available for all.

CERT members organized neighbors into impromptu teams: first aid, fire suppression, search and rescue, and logistics. George Hines served as operations officer; Stephanie Hines and Debbie Kassarjian directed personnel. Knute Fisher used ham radio to contact the El Cerrito Emergency Operations Center, and Michael Kassarjian was overall incident commander. The objectives were minimal: get to the meeting spot and organize into teams. Still, neighbors commented on how valuable it was to take this first step. One said that she couldn't see in the abstract how neighbors could help neighbors after a disaster, and the drill helped her to visualize the process. The neighborhood's next drill will involve medical

triage, fire suppression, and search and rescue.

CERT members passed out fliers suggesting three easy things households can do right away: store 10 gallons of drinking water per person, have a plumber install an automatic shutoff valve on gas meters—and sign up for a CERT class. Garden Party Supports Kensington's Young Scholars



regional fire and aviation management officer.

Tony Lloyd, then chair of the Kensington Police Protection and Community Services District, which manages the park, called a meeting to examine the grounds. A group gathered, including Danielsen and O'Brien, and then, as Danielsen says with a smile, "People started talking." And talking...

By May 2014, Danielsen and O'Brien were raring to go. "Dan and I went through the park and identified trees that we agreed from our very different backgrounds would carry fires to structures," says Danielsen. "We decided to start where fire could go from public land to privately owned land. Then we broke it down into doable projects."

At first the two thought they could get it done in a series of workdays, but it quickly became apparent that maintaining the park is continuous—and fun. "I think the only thing we have in common is that we'd rather work than talk," says Danielsen of the core group of volunteers. "Once we discussed what political parties we belong to, and I don't think that any of us belonged to the same party. You could call us work-addicted mavericks."

O'Brien is no longer part of the crew. When he retired, he suggested that his wife pick their next zip code, and they ended up in Oregon. But a group of hardy souls show up one afternoon a week, including Katie Gluck, Gretchen Gilfillan, Ray Barazza, and Peter Liddell. "Last fall we worked in the parking lot taking out old pampas grass, just terrible," Danielsen remembers. "Peter Conrad and Annette McCambrey helped with that. Mabry Benson and my husband John helped."

Others contribute in multiple ways. Ciara Wood wrote and secured a grant from Diablo FireSafe Council, and Len Welsh negotiated with the Arlington Community Church and Bay View Refuse to site a dumpster on church property. "That really helped," Danielsen says. "We fill up the dumpster with green waste and don't have to pay someone to go to the dump any longer."

Danielsen says there is plenty more to do: "There is blackberry that needs reduction, bottle brush needs to be cut down to shrub size. Then there are other sectors of the park such as the arc around the school. Below the tennis courts is great native grassland, but other vegetation is moving into that area." The group will meet October 7, from 2-4, and each Wednesday after that unless it's pouring. "We have gloves and tools, but people are welcome to bring their own," says Danielsen. Participants must sign a liability release, which are available at the Public Safety Building. Contact Danielsen at charlid@pacbell.net for more information.

"We'd love to have families with kids get involved," says Danielsen. "I told my grandson, 'You have to think like a flame.' And he said, 'Granny, flames aren't sentient, they don't think.' It's no fun alone, but it's just delightful when there are a bunch of people working together."
