Who's on First?

Dear Editor:

Kensington is wrapping up a \$9 million renovation of its public safety building (PSB), the most expensive capital project in Kensington's history. The PSB is now modern and seismically safer. Firefighters are housed on the second floor. The first floor, with 1,025 square feet, was designated for "fire district functions," including a large office suite for the district manager, administrative assistant, emergency preparedness coordinator, and a large meeting room.

Meanwhile, in 2021-22, the Kensington Police Department (KPD) was removed from the PSB with plans to dedicate this expensive first floor space to district personnel.

Fast forward to August 2024: The fire board approved a two-year contract to hire a new manager. The contract requires a presence of one five-hour work day per week in Kensington. That requirement can be met two weeks of the month at public meetings at the Community Center in the late afternoon and evening.

With this two-year contract, the first-floor office space allocated for the manager will likely stand vacant most of the time.

The current Kensington Fire Protection District (KFPD) emergency preparedness coordinator has no contractual requirement to be present in the PSB. The recent administrative assistants have worked remotely. Those offices too will likely stand vacant the vast majority of the time.

Meanwhile, Kensington police, who work daily in Kensington, 24/7, are located in a portable in El Cerrito. It is unclear when KPD will return to permanent housing in Kensington. The fire board and the police board, together, should consider using a substantial portion of the new first floor space in the PSB to house a substation for our police officers during their duty shifts. A substation might be as simple as two or three offices and some storage, which would make it easier for the officers on duty to meet with the public and store local records at the building, e.g., for the vacation key program.

Folks, it's time to think creatively to effectively utilize the newly renovated first floor in the PSB and bring our police back to Kensington, one step at a time.

Citizen Forum's Flawed Analysis Dear Editor,

Last month's Citizen Forum editorial discussing the makeup of the board and how elections work in a consolidated or reorganized district contained several significant factual errors. First, the author claimed that it would not be possible for a combined board to include the entire Kensington Fire Protection District (KFPD) board; this is not the case. Lou Ann Texeira, Executive Officer of Contra Costa County Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO) has indicated that, should the KFPD and Kensington Police Protection and Community Services District (KPPCSD) submit a proposal to combine into one district, the board can be expanded to 11 members and thus accommodate all ten current directors. The combined ten-member board can appoint an eleventh member through the normal board vacancy process. Second, the author stated that it is LAFCO who determines how many and which KFPD directors are chosen; this is also incorrect. Texeira has indicated that LAFCO is required to accept the boards' proposal to merge, including the initial makeup of the combined board and the post-merger election sequence, as long as the proposal complies with the law.

With respect to elections, the situation is much simpler than the editorial described. Currently, every two years, Kensington elects either two or three members to each board. A combined district of eleven directors must eventually get back down to five as directors' terms expire. One reasonable and permissible approach (according to Texeira) is to continue alternately electing three members and two members. If, for example, the districts were to combine before the 2026 election, six current directors' (and any eleventhseat appointee's) terms would be expiring, and the 2026 election would be for three seats, reducing the board membership overall from eleven to seven, a permissible, post-merger size. Then, at the 2028 election, the four other current directors' terms would expire, and two seats would be up for election. Thus, after that election, the combined board would have five members, as required by law. At all times, the board would be made up of either equal numbers of current KFPD and KPPCSD directors or directors specifically elected/appointed to the combined district.

Full Agenda at KPOA/KIC Annual **Town Hall Meeting**

The Kensington Property Owners (KPOA) and the Kensington Improvement Club (KIC) will hold an unusually thorough Annual Town Hall and membership meeting, in person at the Community Center and online by Zoom. A roster of experts will speak on especially important timely issues affecting all Kensingtonians: district unification/ consolidation; district governance updates; home insurance cancellations/options, homehardening against wildfire; among other topics. The meeting is one day before the KCC Fall Picnic, on Saturday, October 19, from 10am-noon.

It's not surprising to find that some citizens are unaware Kensington is governed by two separate district boards. Both districts provide services to the same residential properties in Kensington yet have separate administrations and directors. Ridgeline Municipal Strategies has been retained to work with both boards to provide an independent assessment of the financial feasibility of unifying the two governing districts with a single board. Principal consultant Dmitri Semenov will report on fiscal projections for both districts, and if his analysis is completed will also summarize Ridgeline's unification/consolidation findings.

David Aranda, interim general manager of the Kensington Police Protection Community Service District, and Mary Morris-Mayorga, general manager of the Kensington Fire Protection District, will present updates and next steps for district unification/con-

Leah Jacobs Nishi of Farmers Insurance will discuss home insurance cancellations and the California Fair Plan provider of last resort.

Kensington Emergency Preparedness Coordinator Johnny Valenzuela will provide an overview of the National Firewise Communities certification program and application that requires homeowners to harden their properties against wildfire damage. This program is now being considered a factor by some insurers. Kensington residents Alan Siegel and Kay Blonz will explain the process from the perspective of their experiences in establishing Kensington's first two Firewise communities.

Contra Costa County Supervisor John Gioia will speak on relevant county activities and issues including proposed changes to the tree-view obstruction ordinance and Kensington path funding. And parents especially may be interested in a brief update on our community library by library manager Jenny Rockwell.

All Kensington residents are invited to the Town Hall meeting! Doors open at 9:30, so come early for coffee, tea and treats. We hope to see you there! Check www.KPOA.net for the Zoom link to the meeting if you do not attend in person.

Fall Book Sale October 20

The Friends of the Kensington Library (FKL) will hold its annual Fall Book Sale on Sunday, October 20 from 10am-4pm in the employee parking lot behind the library at 61 Arlington Avenue, in collaboration with the Kensington Community Council (KCC) Fall Picnic. The book sale has been a Kensington tradition since 1973, with all funds raised going to support the Kensington Library, underwriting new book purchases and popular library programs for

This fall, the sale will feature a rich and colorful selection of children's picture books from one of the FKL's founding members, Gretchen Gillfillan, who died peacefully at home on June 15 at 92 years of age. A passionate educator who primarily taught 4th grade but also taught a 4/5 combo, she taught in Oxnard, San Diego, Walnut Creek, a couple schools in the East Bay, Orinda, and on Guam.

"A key passion in her life, from a very early age, was her love of reading," writes daughter Gayle. "She imbued this love of books in so many of her students as well as in me. The 'kids' in Mom's first class are now 82 years old."

Gretchen was a key figure in the history of not just the library, but the community of Kensington. In 1959, the Kensington Library was housed in the basement of the Arlington Community Church. That year, Gretchen and a small handful of library advocates organized the Friends of the Kensington Library as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit. Once incorporated, the FKL spearheaded the drive to establish a Kensington County Library Service Area. Approved in 1960, the new service area led to the opening of our current Kensington Library building in 1965.

Gretchen's vision for a community library extended to other art forms. She curated a rotating exhibit of local artwork on the back wall of the library, on which now hangs a certificate of gratitude from Contra Costa County, presented at the library's 50th anniversary by her friend Supervisor John Gioia. The Gretchen Gillfillan Wall continues to display rotating shows from local artists and quilters, with shows booked through February of 2025.

Be a part of the library enrichment by donating books for the sale, either by dropping off books in the donation bin during library open hours, or bringing larger donations (more than 1 bag or box) directly to the bookshed behind the library Tuesdays 11am-1pm.

And on Sunday, October 20, drop by the sale to buy books for your family, a gift for a friend, or the book you always wanted to read. Meet your neighbors and the FKL volunteers who coordinate these twice-yearly sales and the more than forty volunteers who donate their time on the day of the sale. Gretchen will be missed, and the FKL will continue the work she began in 1959 in support of the library and our community.

Second Chances Take a Turn for the Sweet

Sara Jaffe always loved cooking and baking. And she also loved design. She says that while she was attending architectural school, "I taught cooking and did catering. It's always been a part of my life. But during school, I made a decision to go into design work and not the cooking world."

The great thing about aging is that if you're lucky, one has the opportunity to revisit those early decisions. Last January, Jaffe considered starting a home baking business. Friends had suggested it in the past, but she hadn't thought seriously about

it until then. "Once I decided to do it, I plunged right in," she said. The process has been surprisingly joyful and challenging at the same time, and not in the ways that she might have expected.

Jaffe posts a selection of desserts on her website (sarajaffebakes.com) and takes orders online. She bakes and packages the desserts, which are picked up at her house. "I wanted my website to be approachable and enticing. I wanted it to be a bit playful." What she hadn't wanted was to spend time working out glitches on the site. Still, she says, the business is going at the right pace for her to handle it.

Jaffe's offerings are eclectic. "Even though some of the desserts are things I've made

over the years, I still am learning how to move through a day and be efficient," she said. "And I'm learning to be consistent. I did a lot of testing before I was ready to launch."

Because Jaffe does not have a commercial kitchen, she can't offer some desserts. "I can't do custards. I can't do whipped cream. I've been working with butter cream instead. And I'm finding alternatives for certain products to get good flavor. I can't make a dessert with fresh fruit on top—it has to be cooked. As I'm developing a new product, I'm always thinking what's going to make it beautiful, what's going to make it taste good, how to make it unique."



And now that she's operating a business and not just entertaining friends, she has to consider costs and time. "I have to schedule what things should be baked in what order. There's a workflow. Also I went through a lot of packaging decisions. Certain things I made in the past like small loaves are not cost-effective. I realized, no, I can't make small loaves unless I was baking them all day. And certain cakes are very rich and will feed quite a few people, while simpler cakes are still very popular. I began thinking about what are the ones you want to have with a cup of coffee.'

Current offerings are hand pies, a decadent triple espresso cake, a sumptuous layered coconut lime cake, fruit galettes, butter cookies, poppy seed cake and more. Desserts, in other



words, from the simple to the sublime. She is now considering what to offer for the holidays. "I'll develop more cookies," she mused. "And I'm thinking about a pumpkin chocolate cake, a date nut cake. And some desserts that will appeal to people who can't have flour." Her biggest seller so far are chocolate biscotti. "They started out a different flavor," she said. "I may go back to some other flavors. And

Jaffe emphasized that her business is solely pre-order by phone (510-528-4412) or through the website. "It is a learning experience as are most new things," she said. "Much of the learning experience is the business level and website. And seeing what works and how do I build it so

I can take on more. It's a lot of work, but I love it. I'm situated in a great location. Kensington is a good spot."

Nicolet is part of the library's recently relaunched Read to a Dog program. Library manager Jenny Rockwell explained that petting and interacting with gentle, friendly dogs has a positive effect on people, young and old alike. For young readers, a calm, reassuring listener creates a safe, nonjudgmental environment to improve their oral fluency. And spending time with a sweet dog is just plain fun. The Read to a Dog program is intended to help build a child's self-esteem, confidence, and reading enjoyment.

The library partners with the nonprofit volunteer organization, Alliance of Therapy Dogs (ATD). ATD provides testing, certification, registration, support, and insurance for members who volunteer with their dogs in animal-assisted activities. Nicolet's mom and therapy dog handler, Heidi Sand-

ers, ensures the children and dogs are comfortable, safe, and having fun. Sanders has been bringing therapy dogs to volunteer events for 15 years. Nicolet is her fourth therapy dog and has been volunteering with ATD for five years. Nicolet was retired from the Guide Dogs for the Blind breeding program and now thrives as a therapy dog. She is exceptionally calm and loves all people, especially children.

Sanders also has a fifth therapy dog, Pandora, a six year-old Golden Retriever and Labrador Retriever cross. Pandora trained as a service dog with Guide Dogs for the Blind before undergoing a career change to become a therapy dog for the past year and a half. Sanders, Nicolet, and Pandora have volunteered at local libraries, senior centers, and schools, including Kensington Hilltop Elementary.

Sanders loves seeing children reading to Nicolet and Pandora and notices how their reading aptitude and confidence grow. Nicolet and Pandora also volunteer with ATD colleagues that include a Welsh Corgi, a Chihuahua, a Bernedoodle, and a tiny mixed breed named Pixie. Some are playful, engaging goofballs, others are calm and quietly encouraging. Like the array of books at the library, there is a therapy dog that can connect with and inspire each young reader.

Rockwell enjoys seeing the children animatedly reading, turning the books around to point out the pictures to their canine listeners, and smiling with pride as they see the dogs enjoying their storytelling. She has observed how the patience and comfort provided by therapy dogs can gradually transform shy, reluctant readers to voracious bookworms and self-assured speakers.


Kensington Eats at Dolly's By Ittai Shiu
